

Saranac Lake, N. Y., Feb. 16.—Arthur Staff, American, pro-outdoor cycling champion, appeared today to have a real contender for his title in the person of Everett McJowan of St. Paul.

Montreal, Feb. 16.—Tentative draws for the Allan hockey cup were announced yesterday by President W. R. Granger of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association.

Albany, N. Y., Feb. 16.—One hundred and sixteen New York state soldiers took their own lives overseas during the war, so a statement issued today by Adjutant Gen. Kincaid said.

The officers particularly were overcome with the feeling that winning the war was an impossible task and that the world's culture was to be swept away by the triumph of the German arms.

Montreal, Feb. 16.—The Bank of Montreal defeated Big Four 6-1, and Royal Bank won from Bank of Commerce 6-0.

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London, Feb. 16.—The Bank of England today reduced its rate of discount to four and one-half per cent.

The reduction of the Bank of England rate was primarily made possible by the recent large reduction in the government's floating debt and currency circulation, which contributed to the plethora of funds in the money market.

The discount rate of the Bank of England has been five per cent since November 3, last, when it was reduced from the five and one-half per cent rate established on the preceding July 21.

The highest rate was reached in August, 1914, after the outbreak of the war, when it was set at ten per cent, which had been equalled on only two previous occasions: those of the panic of 1866 and 1896.

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
