THE LOYALISTS' SOCIETY

A well attended meeting of the Loyalists Society was held last evening at their rooms, Union street.

D. R. Jack, secretary and historian of the society, reported at some length upon his recent visit to the public record office in London, England, where a vast amount of Loyalist records are stored in the custody of the British government.

The society decided to hold the usual Loyalist anniversary service on May 18, which during the present year falls upon Sunday, and also a celebration along similar lines to those followed during the past two years, upon the Monday following.

The historian was invited to prepare a paper upon a suitable subject to be read in the public schools on Loyalist day. Considerable business of a routine character was also dealt with.

Daily Hints For the Cook

CURRY OF CHICKEN. Cut up a raw chicken, put it in a stew-pan with two ounces butter, half an onion sliced thin, a few sprigs of parsley and thyme, and two ounces lean jam; let the whole stew gently a few minutes. Add a large spoon of curry powder and a small one of flour. Shake the whole five minutes over the fire, then put to it a pint of gravy or water; let the whole simmer till the chicken is done; then take it out and rub the sauce through a sieve, boil it up, skim and season well.

CRANBERRY SAUCE

One quart cranberries, about a pint of water. Let cook until cranberries are soft enough that you can mash them with a spoon. Take off and strain into a sugar scoop (a good big cupful) of sugar, shut your eyes and put in some more, as I was taught. Sometimes I put in two cupfuls and a pinch of salt. Let cook until seeds and froth rise. Skim them off, let cool a little, pour in dish and set in cold place.
