UNITED STATES MAY INTERVENE IN HONDURAS

South American President Favors a Protectorate—Costa Rica Next on the List.

MEXICO CITY, Mex., July 23.—That the United States contemplates the formation of a protectorate over the Republic of Honduras in the near future was the statement brought to this city by a secret agent of one of the Central American republics. The agent left Panama on the steamer Newport and arrived at Corinto, Nicaragua, July 21. His fellow passenger was General Domingo Yagüez, a former president of Venezuela who was exiled through the efforts of President Zelaya of Nicaragua in 1905.

The Newport was met at Corinto by an American gunboat and the officers of the warship accompanied Yagüez ashore to the officers of the command of the port. This latter officer was informed that Yagüez left for Venezuela, capital of Honduras. He is there conferring with President Deville, who is said to look with favor on a protectorate as he fears that he will lose his office through the opposition party, which is daily growing stronger.

It is said that the United States may have to intervene in Costa Rica soon.

BOUND HIMSELF WITH ROPES

Eastman College Student Sits Up a Session After Reading a Story

DOUGHERTY, July 23.—A startling story was told to the police tonight by Arthur V. Little, an Eastman College student, who declared that burglars had overpowered and robbed him in Mrs. Stanley Bartlett's fashionable boarding house at 238 Mill street.

Little was found by him. "Theodore Bartlett, bound in a chair in the library, and apparently unconscious. This was at 6 o'clock, when Bartlett returned after a short absence, leaving Little alone in the house. Dr. J. W. Poucher was summoned. Bartlett, who is a student at the college, was taken to the hospital and the physician worked over him half an hour to get him to his feet and take notice of things.

The police were told of the affair, and Chief of Police McCabe and Sergeant Sheedy went through the building.

FISHER BOYS FIND BODIES OF HURRICANE VICTIMS

Man and Wife Seen in Clad Clashed in Each Other's Arms—E. A. Booth, Swept From Pier, Rescued After Two Days Afloat.

HOUSTON, Texas, July 23.—The bodies of Captain R. L. Bettison and his wife, scantily clad and stiffed in life-preservers, were found together in the tangled seaweed. Captain Bettison and his wife were among the men who were swept off Tarpon Pier, Galveston, by the hurricane on Wednesday.

Simultaneously comes the news that Ernest A. Booth, one of the party on the pier, was rescued alive near Morgan's Point. He had been floating on driftwood for nearly 48 hours.

The Abernathy family, living near High Island, has been accounted for and no additional deaths have been reported from the country about the Matagorda Peninsula.

McGILLAN COULD NOT STAND FOR BUILDING CODE

Verbs Tammany's Notorious Measure Which Was Vigorously Opposed by Citizens.

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 23.—Mayor McGillan, himself a Democrat, tolled today the revised building code by vetoing the measure recently pushed through the board of aldermen by Tammany.

Its almost prohibitive clause governing the proposed regulations for the use of a rumpus which reached the mass meeting and billiard stage. The allied real estate interests fought the proposed regulations tooth and nail as did contractors and other interests whose materials were hit.

WILD WEST HOLDUP IN NEW YORK STATE

Thrilling Tale Told by Passengers but Railway Officials Say It is Exaggerated.

NEW YORK, July 23.—Conflicting reports of the hold-up on the Erie R. R. in which western-bound immigrants were the victims, reached this city tonight from Middletown, N. Y. The hold-up is reported as having occurred just after the western express left the Bergen tunnel in New Jersey, about 12:15 a. m.

The varying reports of the affair say that either one or two men stepped into the first of two coaches bound westward, holding the passengers at bay with revolvers, stripped them of money and valuables, and made good their escape.

Officers of the Erie R. R. said tonight that a few immigrants had been robbed but they deny that the robbery had the wild west aspect given in some of the reports.

PORTLAND WILL HAVE ST. JOHN'S SYMPATHY

Threatened With Necessity of Water Extension Over at Cost of Over a Million.

PORTLAND, Me., July 23.—Alterations and improvements to the water supply system in this city, Westbrook, Gorham, South Portland and Falmouth, estimated to cost a million dollars, are recommended as urgent by Allen Hazen, hydraulic engineer, in a report to the water district trustees. This is after an exhaustive survey of the entire system which was purchased just two years ago by the district comprising Portland and South Portland. He finds it essential to lay a 48 inch steel supply pipe from Sebago Lake, the source of the supply, to this city, a distance of 16 miles.

WRUNG TO DEATH IN LAUNDRY MANGLE

Horrible Accident to Employee in New York Laundry.

NEW YORK, July 23.—Max Ozono was literally wrung to death in the mangle of a Hoboken laundry this afternoon. His hand caught between immense rollers and he was crushed and flattened like a moist garment before aid reached him. He was 30 years old and lived in New York City.

ERADICATE WHITE PLAGUE FROM THE CITY THROUGH SCHOOL CHILDREN, IS PLAN

Pennsylvania Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis Will Begin Campaign of Education at Opening of Term With Exhibits and Lectures to Pupils.

PHILADELPHIA, July 23.—At the beginning of the public school year this fall the Pennsylvania Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis will begin a campaign in the public schools of Philadelphia looking to the eradication of the white plague from this city.

Physicians and others who have made a study of methods of fighting the disease will lecture, exhibits will be placed in all the grammar and secondary schools and through the schools, an effort will be made to reach the homes and have householders take care of their abodes in such a manner that infection will be impossible.

Wallace Hatch, executive secretary of the society, stated yesterday that the officers of the society had held a conference with Martin G. Brumbaugh, superintendent of schools, and that all arrangements for the campaign, with the exception of the school, is applicable to the school.

It is estimated by experts that almost every city dweller over 18 years old has tuberculosis either in a latent or an active form, or has had it and has recovered. While this is true of the city population, it is applicable to the rural districts as well, though in a lesser degree. Von Behring, the German expert, has brought out the fact that tuberculous infection usually takes place during childhood. It is conceded that 60 per cent. of the children who attend the public schools have the tubercle bacilli in their system.

EASILY CHECKED IN CHILDREN

It is at this stage, the society's experts say, that tuberculosis should be treated and that it can be most effectively checked. Physicians all say that treatment instituted at this period is unfeeling in its results—a hundred per cent. of cures—and it is exceedingly simple.

Realizing this fact, the management of the Pennsylvania Society has entered upon a campaign which, it hopes, will ultimately drive tuberculosis from all of the schools of Philadelphia. It is the society's policy to have the public school officials have signed their willingness for a good part of the school year to be devoted to work along this line.

DAVID CHARGED WITH ROBBERY

Well Dressed Young Man Arrested

Goods Found on Him

Walter H. Bell, Proprietor of St. John Creamery the Victim

Another stealing case was reported to the police yesterday afternoon, and ere many minutes had passed a man by the name of Joseph David was located and placed under arrest as the guilty one.

Mr. Walter H. Bell, proprietor of the St. John Creamery, King street, from whom the goods were stolen, called on Chief of Police Clark yesterday afternoon about four o'clock, and stated that an overcoat valued at \$20, underclothes valued at \$12.50, and a pair of gloves, had been stolen from him. David, the man arrested, had worked for the creamery as a teamster for about three months, he said; and about the same time as the clothes had mysteriously disappeared, David had also made his disappearance. On finding the clothes had been stolen, Mr. Bell at once suspected his former employee, as the pinner.

These circumstances of the case as reported by the owner, were given to the Chief of Police. Clark, who was the owner of the stolen goods, sent Officer Joseph Scott in search of him. The officer, without experiencing much difficulty, located him at his boarding house, No. 23 Peters street, between five and six o'clock, and forthwith arrested him. David was found in the room, and was taken to the Central Police Station, where he was locked up in a cell. The overcoat and gloves were found in David's room, and were later identified by Mr. Bell, as his property.

The prisoner was a young man of 21 years of age, well dressed and respectable in his appearance. He is said to be a French-Canadian, formerly of Montreal.
