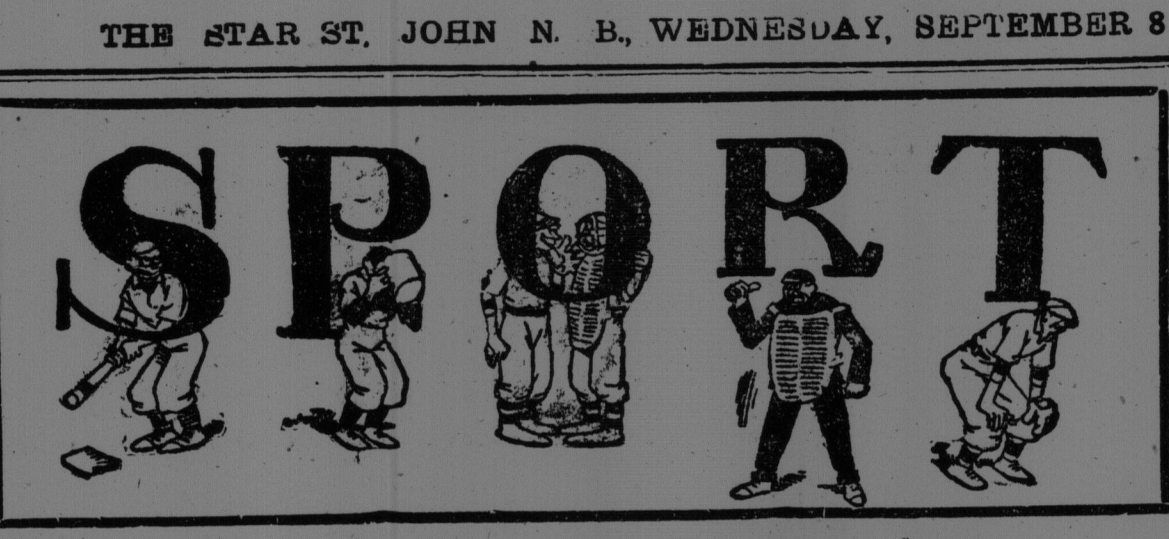
SPORT IN ENGLAND.
