"I spoke to the students of the American College along patriotic and moral lines, giving the Catholic church a full share of the credit for the great work accomplished by all the Christian churches. He had received further instructions in the meantime and said that I did not speak at the Methodist church, the audience would hold good. I replied that I appreciated the intended courtesy, but the alternative was impossible. I would speak as announced and thus would be obliged to forego the audience with the Pope. When I advised Dr. Fipple, the pastor of the Methodist church, he said that he was ready to release me from the engagement, but I answered that that was impossible. Under the circumstances, I felt obligated to speak in fulfillment of a promise made before the papal audience was arranged."
