Militants Again on Warpath—Another Arctic Expedition Falls—G. T. P. Take Over Western Railway.

Dudley, Eng., April 8.—Militants made an attempt to blow up the ruins of Dudley Castle last night. Gunpowder was used and much damage done. Picarders bearing the sign "votes for women and the consequences," were found scattered about the building. The general terror campaign of the outragiers is causing much alarm in all quarters.

Arctic Expedition Falls. Christiania, Norway, April 8.—Failure has overtaken the members of the German Arctic expedition under Lieut. Schroeder Stranz, several of whom were mired on the ice through exposure and scurvy.

JUDGE LANDRY'S TRIBUTE TO FORMER CHIEF JUSTICE

Fredericton, April 8.—At the opening of the Supreme Court this morning, Judge Landry, senior judge, said: "We have the sad intelligence this morning of the death of ex-Chief Justice Tuck. He passed away peacefully at a ripe old age, having filled an honorable career and accomplished a very useful mission among his fellows. He was very widely and favorably known in whatever capacity he was called upon to act—and he shirked no duty—he filled the trusts confided in him faithfully with manly strength and well. As Chief Justice, the last public function he exercised, he was courteous, accessible, diligent and zealous. He departs, leaving a record of which his native province may well be justly proud. On behalf of the Bench, I extend to the bereaved family sincere and deep-felt sympathy."

P. E. I. FISHERIES.

(Charlottetown Guardian.) In the excellent address delivered by W. F. Tidmarsh before the Charlottetown board of trade Friday evening, and reported in the Guardian Saturday morning, as well as in the discussion which followed, there are many points which cannot be too strongly emphasized. We have been talking "conservation of natural resources" and some of the most valuable natural resources of the world, namely our fisheries, are being lost to us by our shore undevelopment. Mr. Tidmarsh remarked that the lobster industry is the only branch of our fisheries that has been fully developed and from it the province reaped in 1911 a revenue of \$831,519. He pointed out also that around our shores are abundance of codfish, yet this branch has been practically neglected, although its value, if developed, would be but little less than that of the lobster fisheries. This is inferred from the fact that the total value of the codfish taken in Canadian waters last year was only a little less than that of the lobster catch.

PROVINCE MAY BUY AN AUTOMOBILE.

(Fredericton Gleaner.) It is understood that the purchase of an automobile for the Provincial Board of Works is under consideration. The intention is to secure a car for the use of the engineers of the department in going from place to place in connection with surveys for bridges and also for the new road engineer, who is to be appointed and who will have to visit the different sections of the province in his official capacity.
