-1,500 Theatres Could be Supplied With Films.

The most serious problem confront-ing the British exhibitor today is the tack of Migh-grade theatres, in the opinion of John Oecil Graham, man-aging director of the Famous Players Film Sorvice, Ltd., Famous-Lasky Film Sorvice, Ltd., and the Famous Players-Lasky British Producers, Ltd., who came to New York from London on his annual business trup to the home office of the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation. Approa-imately 1,500 new theatres must be built before the competitive exhibi-tion of motion pictures can be under-taken on the scale which will beet appeal to the British imagination, he believes.

The result is that the British industry has a vast amount of film for which it can find no immediate use. With all of these resources to choose from, the exhibitors have no difficulty an arranging their programmes and most of them are booked up far in ad-vance.
