

# THE ENEMY OF ST. JOHN.

## TUPPER RENEWS HIS ATTACK ON THIS PORT IN THE HOUSE.

He includes Halifax on This Occasion and Says the Intercolonial Should Not Carry Goods to Them for Shipment—Budget Debate Ended.

OTTAWA, May 5.—When the house met today Mr. Flinn introduced a bill to amend the Canada Temperance act (Scott's). His purpose is to give more latitude with regard to penalties and more power with respect to search for liquor.

The budget debate was then resumed, Sir Charles Tupper being the first speaker. He was not present to hear Sir Richard Cartwright last evening, but that did not deter him from, at the very outset of his remarks, calling the minister of trade and commerce a mischievous demagogue. The opposition newly launched at the leader of the opposition, no one taking the trouble to call him to order. Sir Charles Tupper repeated his old story about unrestricted reciprocity, how Blake went back on the Liberal's word and how Cartwright had spoken of distant provinces as "rags and tatters" of the dominion.

Sir Richard (laughing)—"I don't think I said that."

Somebody told Sir Charles Tupper what Sir Richard Cartwright said and then he diverted a few moments to the abuse of Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

"Nothing," said Sir Charles, "would have made me leave my position in England in 1891 but for the fact that British institutions were at stake."

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# MARITIME INCIDENTS.

## NOTES OF NEWS CLIPPED AND COLLECTED FROM THE THREE PROVINCES.

North Shore Bridges Badly Damaged by the Flood—Northport Men Escapes Drowning After a Hard Struggle—Civil Engineer Jumps from a Canoe.

Bowmer, May 5.—Mr. Bates and English, two experts, who have been prospecting at Lower Millstream, claims to have struck rich specimens of antimony on the farm of Hiram Sharp, situated on the road to Bellville. He has some fine specimens and says the ore can be found in abundance.

Hon. H. R. Emerson was in town last night and was a guest at the Queen hotel. It is said he was here interviewing some of our prominent men regarding a bill for oil.

On Saturday two spans of the Metapedia bridge were washed out, with the third likely to follow. The second and third spans from the Quebec side are carried away and the one near the land, which was carried away in the freshet of 1897, is found and still in place.

A section of the Bonaventure bridge is also carried away, making it impossible for the railway to transfer passengers and freight. The water of the Saguenay river was very rough being swollen by the usual spring floods, and the bridge was completely destroyed.

Reputy civil engineer for the provincial government, S. R. MacClintock, came very near losing his life last Thursday while crossing the Saguenay river in a canoe with one companion. He was returning from a surveying trip and was hurrying to catch the morning express for Campbellton. The waters of the Saguenay river were very rough being swollen by the usual spring floods, and the bridge was completely destroyed.

When about quarter of eight, the canoe suddenly became unmanageable and the man was thrown overboard. He was rescued by a passing steamer.
