**STRAIGHT FOUR**

**CENTS A PINT**

**Milkmen in Meeting Decided on This Price for Milk to Customers**

**QUART FIGURE WILL BE SEVEN CENTS**

**Decided Also to Increase the Price for Cream Both Wholesale and Retail - Milkmen Agree to Stand by Agreement and Not to Take Each Other's Customers.**

The Milk Dealers' Association of this city decided at a meeting Thursday on a straight four cent rate for a pint of milk for their private customers. This is to go into effect immediately. The quart price will be seven cents. Commencing from Monday the price of cream will be boosted from 20 cents wholesale and 25 cents retail to 25 cents wholesale and 30 cents retail.

There was quite a representative gathering at the meeting yesterday in Bowmans hall, Brunswick street. New officers were elected, viz: James Macdonald, president; Saml. Creighton, vice-president; J. D. Macdonald, secretary, and J. Donovan, treasurer. Thomas Robinson, Harry Floyd, Thomas Davidson, Rupert W. Wignmore and Thomas A. Barrett, with the president and treasurer, were appointed an executive committee.

There was quite a lengthy discussion on the advancing of the price of milk. A resolution to stand by each other in the matter and not to cut prices or accept each other's customers at any price was passed.

J. Donovan, who occupied the chair previous to the election of officers, suggested the four cent rate for a pint of milk. He and other speakers who followed pointed out that the shops where milk is handled will charge that figure. It was also urged that it would be inconvenient to change four cents one day and three cents the next to the same customers.

The argument that had the most weight with the meeting, however, was that the old rate of three cents a man would have to have 100 pint customers to make \$3 a day. Out of this he would have to pay for his milk and perhaps the most high as it was five years ago, when they sold it for thirty cents wholesale and forty cents retail.

Two men out the price five years ago and self defense the dealers all had to follow suit. A fact not generally known to the householders, however, is that there are two grades of cream on the market. One is the pure cream, and the other is the cream that has been churned on the machine and is not so pure.

As to cream, it was claimed that those who applied the fluid along the line of the I. C. R. have recently raised their prices five cents a quart, which makes the increase in the price of milk a household could buy cream in the city at 25 cents retail. But at the increased rate the milkmen point out, when they sell it for thirty cents wholesale and forty cents retail.
