

City Police Court. Three males and two females had their names on the sheet this morning and appeared in the dock to answer the charges preferred against them. James Gwynne was arrested in Duke street and confessed being drunk. He was fined \$4.

Francis McManus arrested drunk in Charlotte street, pleaded first offence. The \$4 fine imposed will cause him to remember his first appearance. Patrick Cunningham also paid \$4 for the same offence.

The other set had two representatives, one aged eighteen, the other having reached the age of sixty. Isabella Nickerson arrested drunk in Sheffield street, acknowledged the offence, and was fined \$4 and two months in the penitentiary. She is a young branch of the Nickerson family who are well known in police circles.

Mary Keefe was found lying drunk in a yard of Pitt street. She denied the charge, saying she was troubled with a lightness in her head. The evidence was sufficient to convict and she was fined \$4.

Lina Seely was brought down from jail and remanded for another week, as Capt. Hane from whom she stole the watch is absent from the city. The Magistrate informed him that the watch had been found in the possession of the person with whom he left it. He received the information with some indignation.

Thomas G. Baldwin was one of the liquor cases accused with selling liquor on Sunday. The information was made by one James Ward, and appears to have been done through spite, as Baldwin had had him arrested for debt. The witnesses summoned all swore that they had no knowledge of the sale, and his son swore that the bar was not open and that no liquor was sold. Ward tried to shake the evidence of the young man by asking him if he knew the nature of an oath, as well as some puzzling questions about the Trinity. The charge was dismissed.

John Tole was placed in gaol on a peace warrant, and was this morning allowed to go on producing a certificate that he had taken the pledge, and a promise that he would conduct himself better in future. James McCreedy was charged with using abusive language to John N. Hill, the landlord. The charge was withdrawn without trial.

A number of cannon and other munitions of war for the Carlists were landed yesterday, on the coast of the Province of Biscay. A body of insurgent troops made a sortie from Carthagena, but were unsuccessful in their efforts to pierce the line of the besting force, and returned to their quarters.

It is reported to have been set on fire by a prisoner, in order to escape. The British-American Mixed Claims Commission is hurrying forward its business, as Newport, pending an adjournment till the 24th inst. OTTAWA, Sept. 12. To-day D. Y. McMullen made some additional statements. He never saw the telegram which was published in Geo. McMullen's letter. Hon. Mr. Chaplin, deposed to the fact that the McMullens' charges against the Government. Sir George Carter was always strongly opposed to American influence. Senator Cochrane knew nothing, and did not know why Huntington had named him. Robert Hall never had any conversation with Huntington, and knew nothing of the matter now before the Commission. He could not imagine why he had been summoned. His appointment as Director in the Charter of the Pacific Railway Company, was made by Sir Hugh Allan, who nominated Senator Foster. The signing of the Charter was delayed some time by the efforts of Sir Hugh to induce the Government to appoint Foster. The Government remained firm in their choice of witnesses.

Cumberland was Director of the Interior Company, and is now a Director in the Chartered Company. He knew nothing about Huntington's charges. October, after election was over, Campbell and Sir John A. Macdonald both agreed with him respecting an amalgamation of the two Canadian Companies, and both expressed themselves strongly against the introduction of American element, and offered ample guarantees to the Interior-Company that Americans should be excluded from the company. Sir Hugh Allan is subpoenaed to appear before the Commission on Wednesday next.

OTTAWA, Sept. 13. The Postmaster General offers a reward of \$500 for the discovery of the persons who directed the slip of paper enclosing the stolen letter to John Young. The investigation was assumed yesterday. An employe in the Herald office recognized part of the writing on the wrapper as that of a gentleman in Montreal, whose name has not yet been published. The remainder of the writing is supposed to have been written by another person. The investigation is being held with closed doors. It is believed that the clue that has been obtained will lead to the discovery of the thief. Publicity at present would, it is feared, defeat the ends of justice.

LONDON, Sept. 11. THE CAPTURED BLOCKADE RUNNER. It is reported that Esal Granville has told a representative of Spain here that the British Government insists on the liberation of the officers and crew captured on the steam yacht Deerpound. THE DONCASTER CUT was won by Uhan, beating Lillian and Thorn. THE SITUATION IN SPAIN is said to be improving. The new reserves are being armed rapidly. The express train which left Victoria this morning for Madrid, while going at full speed, ran off the track. Many passengers were killed, among them one General and several other persons of prominence. The cause of the disaster is unknown. Obstructions were placed by Carlists yesterday on the railway from Saragossa to Pampalunas, and a train thrown from the track. No one was killed. Six persons were killed and thirty-two injured by the accident to the train from Victoria.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13. THE DEPARTURE OF THE GERMAN. The evacuation of Fortin by the Germans will be completed to-morrow. There will be a great public rejoicing and a general illumination of the town in the evening. THE TRANS-ATLANTIC BALLOON collapsed at Brooklyn yesterday in the presence of an immense crowd assembled to see the proposed ascension. SHOT AND KILLED. General E. S.
