

A MODERN MARTYR.

Arval sufferings and death of the Bishop of Monrovia.

LONDON, Oct. 29.—The diary of the Right Rev. Jas. Hannington, D.D., Missionary Bishop of Monrovia, who was appointed in 1884, and who was put to death by order of King Mwangi of Uganda, Africa, has been published. Giving the details of the last week of his life he describes the arrival of his party at Ludwa, where the chief at the head of a thousand troops demanded ten guns and three barrels of powder. The chief then asked Bishop Hannington to remain with him for a day and the latter complied. While taking a walk the bishop was attacked by about twenty natives and struck with his assault arms, but became weak and faint and was dragged violently a long distance by the leg. When his persecutors halted they stripped and robbed him and imprisoned him in a miserable hut, full of vermin and decaying bananas. While he was lying there, ill and helpless, the chief and his hundred wives came out of curiosity to feast their eyes on him. On the next day he was allowed to return to his tent, where, though ill, he felt more comfortable. He was guarded, however, by natives. He remained in bed during the following days. Parties of the chief's wives, out of idle curiosity, came daily to see him. He was allowed to send messages to friends, but he believed they were intercepted. In the second day he writes that he never continued, that at night the place swarmed with vermin, that his guards were drunk and noisy, and that he was unable to sleep. At last he became delirious. On the eighth day, September 29, he became unconscious. His entries on this day are brief: "No news. A hymn howled all night, smothering the sick man. Hope he will not have yet." This is the final entry. It is believed that shortly after writing this he was taken out and put to death.
