Wheg to inform you the Attache Department having

been sowised that a number of Indians living on the borders of Lake Manouan in the Province of Quebic, were described of securing a Referve, where their houses are located, the Inspector of Indian Reserves was instructed to visit the locality and report as the their requirements. I may state that the Inspector has reported that 19 men, 21 women, 16 bors and 18 limis, being a total of 174 Indians, belonging to the Teter des Boules part of the St. Maurice Band, are living on Lake Manouan and desire to have a Reserve set aside for them at this point.

tuted as a Reserve comprises a Block of land about 2 miles frontage on Manouan River and one mile in depth, the said 1280 acres to include on the West the land now occupied by Abram Chaquim West of Little Dam Creek opposite the point known as Drinking Point on the Manouan River and on the East, the land occupied by John Kaweiasiketch, immediately West of a Creek known as Maytayfishkeka Seepeesis or "the creek where the swamp runs up into the bush".

I may point out that two tracts of land have already been set aside for the Tetes des Boules Indians under the provisions of 14aand 15 Vic, Cap 106, Lower Canada comprising 7408 acres at Waymontachinque and 380 acres on Coucoucache, both in the County of Champlain and as the Weymontachinque Reserve is not occupied by Indians, the Department would be willing to release the quantity of land
