PORTUGUESE DISASTER

Expeditionary Force Slaughtered By the Cuamatzo Tribe.

Five Hundred Attacked By Several Thousand Natives and Fearful Disorder. Resulting in Massacre, Escaped White Troops, Out of Ammunition, Made a Bayonet Charge, But Were Overpowered by Numbers - Countrywide in Revolt.

Mossamedes (Portuguese Southwest Africa), Jan. 16.-The disaster sustained by the Portuguese expeditionary force, at the hands of the Cuamatzo tribe is the greatest suffered by a white power in Africa in modern times.

The force, 500 strong, with two guns, after marching for four hours through high thornbush, was suddenly attacked by a big mass of Cuamatzos many thousands strong. When the native troops saw this huge host of the enemy they became frightened, broke the square, and threw themselves on the white troops for protection.

Fearful disorder ensued. The officers exerted themselves heroically to withstand the attack of the enemy, but ammunition ran short, and when a sergeant and some white troops were sent to the main column to ask for more they were only given three rounds for each man.

As was natural, these cartridges were soon used up, and the white troops, in desperation, charged the enemy and killed many with the bayonet, but were overpowered by numbers.

Of the 480 men and 19 officers who set out in the morning, only 243 men and two officers returned to camp, and of these 50 men and one officer were wounded and the two guns were in the hands of the enemy. Not a single shot was fired by the main column, consisting of 1,300 men, with 28 guns, in defence of their slaughtered comrades, but three shells were fired at their own men, whom they mistook for the enemy.

The entire countryside is in revolt.

INFERNAL MACHINE MAN.

Arrested in Philadelphia, He Admits Other Attempted Crimes of That Nature.

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 16.-Gessler Rousseau, who was arrested in this city on Thursday with an unloading infernal machine in his possession, admitted to the police yesterday that he is the man who attempted to destroy the statue of Frederick the Great in Washington last Tuesday, and that it was he also who sent the trunk containing an infernal machine to the Cunard Line's Empress, at New York in May, 1903. The prisoner, whose right name is not known, made these admissions in the detective bureau after he had been identified by persons brought here from New York and Washington for that purpose.

He gives no reasons for the attempted outrages, except "there are too many foreign affairs in this country."

In the Dullman's Brother Toronto, Jan. 16.-It is thought here that Rousseau may be a brother of Karl Dullman now serving in Kingston as leader in Welland Canal conspiracy. A picture of Rousseau, believed here last night might well be a photograph of "Dullman" taken ten or fifteen years ago. The same heavy features, broad nose and large mouth would be recognized by anyone who saw the dynamiter, but the similarity is far from making it certain that the men are brothers.

STRATHCONA WILL PAY.

Damage Done to Royal Victoria Hospital Montreal, By Fire.

Montreal, Jan. 16.-Lord Strathcona has cabled to the authorities of the Royal Victoria Hospital that he will bear the cost of rebuilding the burned portion of the hospital.

Montreal was alarmed at an early hour Saturday morning by the report that the Royal Victoria Hospital was on fire.

It is unfortunately true that a portion of the grand collection of buildings suffered to the extent of several thousands of dollars, and there was much excitement among the patients; but, thanks to the admirable methods adopted in building the centre and east and west wings, there was at no time any danger whatever of the fire reaching the patients. Those who are in a position to know say that they think that \$50,000 will cover the loss. Not a patient was hurt or even disturbed, with one exception, and forms the greatest cause for rejoicing.

The Royal Victoria Hospital has been occupied about 12 years. It was founded by Lord Strathcona and Lord Mount Stephen, who gave half a million dollars each towards its establishment.

Killed By a Train.

Copper Cliff, Jan. 16.-While walking the railroad track this side of Wainwright, John McMillan, aged 60 years, was struck by the second section of No. 2 and instantly killed. The unfortunate man's head was entirely severed from his body. The train crew immediately backed their train and the body was taken to the bander house, pending the arrival of Dr. Struthers, the coroner. The victim of the accident was hard of hearing, and the wind being high, it is thought probable that he did not hear the train.

Costly Dish of Fudge.

St. Cloud, Minn., Jan. 16.-A fire which is said to have been started by the overturning of an alcohol lamp, over which some of the girls were cooking a dish of "fudge," typically destroyed Lawrence Hall, the ladies' dormitory, at the St. Cloud Normal School, Saturday night. The loss is \$25,000, including the building.
