

KELVIN.

A Village situated on Big Creek, lots 12 and 13, fourteenth concession, township of Burford, sixteen miles south-west of Brantford, twelve miles from Princeton station, nineteen from Paris, and eight from Norwichville. The Village was laid out in 1866 by the late John Kelly. The first store was opened the same year by C. H. Foreman. There are two churches in the village, Congregational, Rev. John Armour, and Wesleyan, Rev. Mr. Andrews. The Second Adventists are now erecting another church. There are five saw mills, and three shingle factories in the village. The road to Princeton station will be gravelled and planked the present summer, and it is intended to run a line of stages between the places.
