

GENERAL CONGREGATIONAL STATISTICS.

I. BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.

In the Dominion of Canada and the Island of Newfoundland there are two Congregational Unions (that of "Ontario and Quebec," and the "Nova Scotia and New Brunswick" Union); 5 Associations; 123 Churches; 105 Ministers, 17 of whom are not in pastoral work, and 5 are on Foreign Missions; and 10,680 members as follows:

We have taken much pains in making the above summary full and correct, supplementing the carelessness of a number of churches in Ontario, Quebec and the North-West (some of them large and important), in not sending returns, by adding former figures.

II. ENGLAND AND WALES.

England and Wales have one Congregational Union, Meeting in London in May, and in some place in the provinces in Autumn. London has a Metropolitan Congregational Union, 374 churches, mission rooms and stations, with 221,292 sittings.

There are 47 County Associations, 2,881 ministers, (including London as above); seating accommodation for 1,636,032 persons; 4,618 churches and mission stations.
