Deadly Mines at Sea That Blow Huge Ships of Steel to Atoms; How a Raider is Tracked

Still but little news from the British navy. No landing parties. No bombardments. Only one or two lit- tle skirmishes.

Masters of the German fleet, se- cure in the shelter of fortified har- bors, twiddle their fingers at the Brit- ons and dare them to attack.

It is facile to attempt it. Forts guard the channels, but beyond the range of the guns is a deadly dan- ger.

The ever-existing terror which bars the modern port is the submarine mine carrying from 75 to 100 pounds of gun cotton sufficient to split a battleship from stem to stern as easily as you can crush a match box.

Two kinds of mines protect the harbors of the belligerents. Con- trolled by electric currents, they explode when a ship strikes them. These may be anchored, but often they are not. They are dangerous to friend as well as to foe.

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RUSSIANS STILL ADVANCING PAST TWO FORTRESSES

They Will March Right on From Cracow - Berlin is Goal.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Sept. 30.-A mes- sage from Vienna, dwelling on the Austrian advance through Galicia, says that Russians are in possession of all the railways in the district of Przemysl, and are advancing rapidly in two lines, says a despatch from the Rome correspondent of the Ex- change Telegraph Company. The correspondent continues: "The northern column of Russians has made an assault on Tarrow, the last obstacle between it and Cracow, and distant from the latter place only sixty miles. Another column, after occupying Sanok, has advanced westward with the intention of cutting off the retreat in that direction.

Indications are that the Rus- sians do not intend to capture Cracow, but to leave it cut off and surrounded, and then to advance towards Breslau, hoping to join the Russian center now in Poland.

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
