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School Bill

A second time the Local Government has refused to pass a bill that the school section of Acadia Mines is justly entitled to. We wonder what excuse our representatives will give for refusing justice to this section? About a year and a half ago a petition was circulated and very largely signed, asking the Local Government to pass a bill that would permit all the property owned by residents of the municipality, and situated in Acadia Mines to pay school rates here.

Our representatives very wisely asked for time to inquire into this matter and ascertain whether or not it would be just to introduce special legislation for this district. Time was given them to learn the true state of affairs, and so thoroughly were they convinced of the justice of our petition that they framed a bill and presented it to parliament during the late session. The bill passed the second reading in due time, and was then referred to the committee on law amendments, where it remained for some time. While the bill was before this committee those opposed to it did their utmost to defend it, and as a result it was thrown out, so again justice is denied this school section by the hands of our Local Government.
