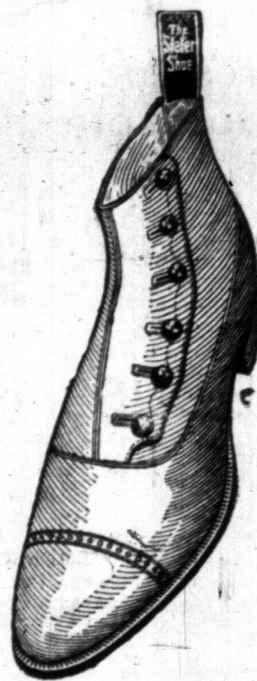

SALISBURY IS ROLLING UP AN IMMENSE MAJORITY.

Noteworthy English Elections of Yesterday.—Liberals Holding Their Own in Yorkshire.

London, Wednesday, Oct. 10, 3 a. m.

From the returns received at midnight, it appears that the government gained two seats in yesterday's polling in the parliamentary general election. These are the Middleton Division of South-east Lancashire, where Mr. E. D. Ffenden defeated Mr. J. Duckworth, Liberal, who represented the constituency in the late Parliament, and Monmouth, where Dr. Rutherford Harris, who now enters parliament for the first time, received 4,412 votes, as against 3,720 cast for his Liberal opponent, Mr. Albert Spicer, who has represented Monmouth since 1892.

Among the other noteworthy elections was that of Mr. William St. John Broderick, Under Secretary of State for foreign affairs in the Guildford division of Surrey, with a majority of 2,207 over his Liberal opponent, Mr. A. W. Chapman, and that of Mr. John Edward Ellis, Liberal, in the Rushcliffe division of Nottinghamshire. Mr. Ellis has represented Rushcliffe since 1885. The ministerialists, in fighting him, made effective use of his pro-Boer letters recently published by Mr. Chamberlain, and the majority he secured at the general elections of 1895 was reduced by about 187 votes.

The Liberals are holding their own in Yorkshire, and in some districts their candidates have doubled their majorities of the previous general election. Five hundred and twenty-two members have been officially declared elected, of whom 387 are ministerialists and 185 belong to the opposition. The ministerialists have gained five seats more than their opponents. Considerable adverse comment, Conservative, as well as Liberal, has been caused by the declaration attributed to Mr. Chamberlain in a recent speech, "A seat lost to the government is a seat sold to the Boers." Mr. Chamberlain writes to the Daily Mail this morning, repudiating the statement, and explaining that what he really said was a quotation from the Mayor of Mafeking, "A seat lost to the government is a seat gained by the Boers." The Daily Mail, commenting editorially upon Mr. Chamberlain's communication, still insists that he went too far, in view of the fact that a large number of Liberals have consistently supported the government's South African policy. The paper also declares that Mr. Chamberlain's tactics will not assist him in his struggle for the premiership, and will arouse uneasiness as to his qualifications for the foreign office.

The Liberals have captured the Torquay Division of Devonshire, Mr. F. L. Barratt, Liberal, defeating Mr. C. R. Rankin, Conservative by 129 votes.

The Liberal flood continued in Derbyshire,

where Mr. O. Partington, Liberal, has captured the High-Peak Division, defeating Mr. S. Roberts, Conservative, and wiping out the previous Conservative majority of 507.

On the other hand, the Unionists have taken a Liberal stronghold, the Burton Division of Staffordshire, Mr. R. F. Radcliffe, Liberal Unionist, defeating Mr. J. E. Johnson-Ferguson, Liberal, by over 2,000 majority.

Mr. Arthur O'Connor, Irish Nationalist, and one of the secretaries of the Irish Parliamentary Party, has been defeated for North Donegal by his brother Nationalist, Mr. O'Doherty. O'Connor's defeat at the polls is regarded as a defeat for the Healyites, as Mr. O'Brien represented the O'Brien-Dillon faction.

Mr. John Morley has been re-elected for Montrose-Burghs in the Liberal interest, receiving 3,900 votes, as against 2,390 cast for Mr. J. B. Don, his Liberal-Unionist opponent.

BADLY BEATEN.

DeWet's Commando Completely Dislodged and Demoralized.

Another Large Quota of Boer Prisoners Landed at St. Helena.

London, October 9.—The British war office has issued orders that the bulk of the militia regiments called out for service during the South African war are to be disbanded. This will effect about 50,000 men.

A Cape Town despatch says:—Mr. Cecil Rhodes will re-enter politics tomorrow, when he will preside over the deliberations of the congress of the South African League.

A BOER PASTOR'S PREDICTION.

Pastor Von Bokkengen has arrived in London from Lydenburg. He says the Boer war will last six months longer unless the British grant independence.

BOERS DISLODGED.

London, Oct. 10.—The Times publishes the following despatch from Vrededorp, Orange River Colony:—"The British forces had a three days' fight, from Oct. 5 to Oct. 7, inclusive, with Gen. De Wet's Commando of a thousand men and five guns. It took place in a veritable sea of mountains near here. The Boers were dislodged and dispersed, and they fled demoralized. The British casualties were slight."

ARRIVALS AT ST. HELENA.

Iceland of St. Helena, Oct. 9.—The British transport Idaho, landed about 200 Boer prisoners here to-day.

Gen. Cronje and the other Boer prisoners are preparing a big celebration of former President Kruger's birthday, to take place to-morrow.

AT SCHWEIZER RENKE.

Vryburg, Oct. 8.—General Settle, with a force of 7,000 men, has relieved the garrison of Schweizer Renke, after an engagement in which the Boers suffered heavy loss. The Boer commandant was captured.

(Schweizer Renke, thirty six miles southeast of Vryburg, on the Hart's River—was held by a tiny British garrison which was surrounded by the Boers early in September. On September 17th Lord Roberts reported that the defenders had strongly entrenched themselves, and having sufficient food, were in no danger of surrender so long as the provisions lasted. A relieving force was, however, being organized, comprising Paget's Horse, Cape Mounted Rifles, and Diamond Fields Horse and Scouts.)

AN INDIAN HERO.

Durban, Oct. 9.—The commandant of Durban has convened a public meeting for the purpose of presenting to a loyal Indian a coat of honor, the gift of Lady Carson of Kedleston. This Indian greatly distinguished himself as a signaller throughout the siege of Ladysmith, and after the relief, when it was decided to honor him, he was only discovered with great difficulty, as he had returned to the colonies to work.

ALLIES AWAKE!

They Are Now Rapidly Concentrating at Pao-Ting Fu.

The Chinese Will Oppose Any Attempt to Pursue Imperial Court.

London, Wednesday, Oct. 10.—The Berlin correspondent of the Standard understands that the Chinese imperial edicts are regarded there with skepticism, and that Count Von Waldersee has been instructed to resume operations.

ALLIES AT PAO TING FU.

The Shanghai correspondent of the Times, wiring Monday, says it is reported that the allies have arrived at Pao Ting Fu without opposition. The Times has the following from Tien Tsin, dated Oct. 7:—"Three French battalions started yesterday for Pao Ting Fu. The British are waiting for the Germans, but may start without them."

CHINESE CONCENTRATING.

The Standard's Tien Tsin correspondent, wiring on Sunday, says:—"I hear that the Chinese are concentrating at Huang Li Pao, leading into the province of Shan Si, with the intention of opposing any attempt of the allies to pursue the imperial court."

THE VICEROY'S THREAT.

A Shanghai despatch says:—The Chinese assert that the governor of Shan Tung and the Yang Tse viceroys have sent a joint memorial to the Emperor declaring it to be impossible to guarantee the despatch of money and provisions to Si Ngan Fu, and threatening to resign unless the court returns to Peking. It is believed that Emperor Kwan Su is anxious to return and that the Empress Dowager wavered until she heard of the expedition to Pao Ting Fu. Li Hung Chang's secretary reports that foreign troops, supposed to be British, have already arrived at Pao Ting Fu. It is said that Li Hung Chang has advised the Emperor to return to Peking, on the ground that the powers can stop supplies from reaching the province of Shan Si.

EMPEROR TO RETURN.

Peking, Oct. 6.—Prince Ching has received an edict from the Emperor, dated October 1, in reply to a note sent at the request of the legations, saying he will return to Peking as soon as the negotiations take a favorable turn.

WAITING FOR THE GERMANS.

The Pao Ting Fu expedition is waiting for the Germans, who are not ready to start. It is reported that there are 12,000 Chinese imperial troops at Pao Ting Fu. Gen. Chaffee has returned here.

EMPRESS SERIOUSLY ILL.

Trustworthy Chinese reports say that the Dowager Empress is seriously ill at Tai-Yuan-Fu (province of Shan-Si), and the free hand of the Emperor in affairs of state of late is regarded as confirmatory of these reports.
