KINGSTON'S BRIBE

Government Buys the Locomotive Works There

And is Starting Work in Them To-day

—A Costly Piece of Corruption.

Montreal, Nov. 7.—On the eve of election the Government has made a coup with which it is hoped to capture Kingston. The Kingston locomotive works, which have been closed for many months, and which formerly employed 400 hands, have been purchased from the Bank of Montreal for \$75,000. Hon. Wm. Hartly has been in town for several days negotiating the deal, and several days ago offered \$85,000 for the works. The bank refused to sell for a dollar less than \$75,000, and that cash down. Mr. Hartly waited until yesterday afternoon, and finally agreed to pay the amount, and did so. Immediately afterwards he went to the long-distance telephone and notified Kingston. He gave instructions to have the fires started. He stated that he had an order from Blair for twenty locomotives. The Liberals think this will be enough to buy Kingston.

It remains for the electors of Canada to show whether they can be bribed with their own money or not. The Kingston works would not have been compelled to shut down had Mr. Blair given the concern orders between elections. He then gave the order to American locomotive works.

McKINLEY RE-ELECTED. Makes a Greater Sweep Than in 1896—Takes all the Doubtful States.

New York, Nov. 7.—The real call of states at this hour is apparently as follows: McKinley—California, 9 votes; Connecticut, 6; Delaware, 3; Illinois, 24; Indiana, 15; Iowa, 13; Maine, 6; Maryland, 8; Massachusetts, 15; Michigan, 14; Minnesota, 9; New Hampshire, 4; New Jersey, 10; New York, 35; North Dakota, 3; Oregon, 4; Ohio, 23; Pennsylvania, 32; Rhode Island, 4; Vermont, 4; West Virginia, 6; Wisconsin, 12; Washington, 4; Wyoming, 3; Total, 287.

Bryan—Alabama, 11 votes; Arkansas, 8; Colorado, 4; Florida, 4; Georgia, 13; Louisiana, 8; Mississippi, 9; Missouri, 17; Montana, 3; Nevada, 3; North Carolina, 11; South Carolina, 9; Tennessee, 12; Texas, 15; Utah, 3; Virginia, 12; Total, 142.

Unreported—Idaho, 3; Kansas, 10; Kentucky, 13; Nebraska, 8; South Dakota, 4; Total, 38.

If all the unreported states should turn out as Democrats, it would not change the result. The latest returns from Nebraska indicate a Republican plurality. The fifty-seventh congress seems to be Republican by a substantial working majority.

The gubernatorial tickets have apparently followed the national and Odell is elected in New York, and Yates in Illinois.

NEW YORK'S SURPRISE.

The election returns received up to midnight, while very incomplete from many states, showed a pretty definitely that the election has been a landslide for McKinley, and that his plurality will be larger than in 1896. New York on which the Democrats placed such great hope, went for McKinley by 159,000; while the city was conceded to Bryan early in the evening, and the returns thus far show that he carried the city by about 25,000; his gain there was not nearly enough to offset the vote given McKinley throughout the state. The election was quiet in the city and state. Odell has been elected governor over Stanchfield by at least 35,000.

In Illinois, where Bryan was expected to show up strong, McKinley made a surprising run, beating out the Democratic candidate, according to an estimate, based on about half the returns, by about 20,000. McKinley also has a big majority in Cook County. Alsemler, Democratic candidate for governor, is ahead of Yates, Republican, but the slight plurality does not indicate any decisive result. In Seneca county's home precinct in Blooming, McKinley was given 300 votes and Bryan 112.

The returns from Indiana are very meagre, but they indicate that while the Democrats have made gains, the state has gone for McKinley. Ohio's vote has gone largely for McKinley, but the returns are slow and his plurality cannot be estimated. Cincinnati has given him a plurality of 15,000.

AT BRYAN'S OWN HOME.

Nebraska, Bryan's home state, it is believed, will go for McKinley by 4,000. In Bryan's own precinct in Lincoln, McKinley was given over 100 more votes than the Democratic candidate.

Kentucky, according to slight returns, will give a small majority to both McKinley and Yerkes, (Rep.) for governor.

Maryland, which the Democrats expected to carry, has been conceded to McKinley, and it is believed his majority will reach 11,000.

Massachusetts has gone for McKinley by a good margin, although Bryan carried the city of Boston. Returns from the western states are very meagre. Those thus far received show McKinley slightly ahead in California, Washington and Oregon. Some of the statements by different leaders are as follows:

Chairman Jones of the Democratic national committee—I cannot predict the result. The returns are so insufficient as to preclude all possibility of good guess. The figures from New York indicate that the Republicans have carried the state, and I see that they are claiming Maryland and Ohio. The former claim may be right, but I am unable to say as to Ohio, for the reason that we do not yet know how the vote stands. The full returns will be late in coming in and they may make some surprising changes from present apparent stand.

National Committee-man Joseph Manley—The reports at headquarters show that President McKinley is re-elected by an electoral vote larger than he received in 1896. New England, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, West Virginia, Ohio, Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, and South Dakota, are all in the Republican column.

Treasurer Cornelius N. Bliss of the national Republican committee—McKinley and Roosevelt are unquestionably elected by a much larger electoral vote than McKinley received four years ago. New York will give at least 125,000 plurality for the national ticket, Illinois 100,000. New Jersey over 40,000, and Maryland from 8,000 to 10,000. Odell's election as governor is equally certain.

HOW THE HOUSE WILL STAND.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—Returns from 361 of the 386 congressional districts show that the Republicans have elected 163, the Democrats 135, the fusionists 1, the silverites 1, and the populists 1. The Republicans have gained 12 districts, while the Democrats have gained 7, and Republican gain of 5.

LIBERAL TACTICS.

Wholesale Fraud and Forgery Resorted to in Quebec

Nothing but the Race Cry is Being Heard on the Reform Side.

Montreal, Nov. 7.—(Special)—The supporters of the Tarte-Laurier party in the Province of Quebec have threefold all pretense of appealing for support in the name of the Liberal party. The government candidates are all placed now as candidates of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and French-Canadians are appealed to only to support a leader of their own race.

Messrs. Bergeron, Casgrain, Talbot and other French Conservatives, are in the field purely as Conservatives, and have scorned to use racial appeals.

An indication of the desperate nature of the situation can be gotten from the fact which came out in the court, that Laurierites had tried to get naturalization papers for

a large number of Italians, Chinese, and Roumanian Jews. Being objected to, the papers were annulled, when it was found they had been resorted to. Parties not having made application for naturalization were granted, names being placed on the list so that immigrants would be able to vote for a government candidate.

The sum of \$10,000 has been put in the hands of R. D. McGibbon, Q. C., to bring to justice those who attempt to violate the law, and the Canadian secret service has engaged a large number of able-bodied men to aid their regular detective force engaged to watch the polls. Strenuous efforts will be made to smash the machine.

ALL ARE PLEASED

How London Papers View the Result of the Elections.

McKinley's Re-election Insures a Stable Money Policy and no Change in the U. S. Foreign Policy.

London, Nov. 7.—The morning papers went to press too early to be in a position to comment on the result of the American election, but all published elaborate dispatches describing the progress of the contest. The Daily Chronicle says: "Considering the excitement over the enormous electoral area, the tranquility of this great contest is remarkable."

The Standard says: "There can be no reasonable doubt that President McKinley has been re-elected. The isolated case of tumult should serve only to emphasize the admirable spirit and common citizenship with which the people of the republic play their part in the on-going struggle for masters. It is significant that racial animosity was the cause of the conflicts."

The Standard goes on to express the frankest satisfaction over the success of Mr. McKinley, adding: "This success insures the continuance of stability in money matters and no change in the foreign policy of the United States. The triumph of Mr. Bryan would have been felt everywhere as heralding a sharp reversal of the policy, fear of which has made the United States a powerful member of the family of nations. Continuity of control at Washington is a guarantee of peace, and in this sense a republican victory will be welcomed by every European state."

The Daily Telegraph says: "Englishmen have never had since Lincoln's time a deeper interest in the issue of a presidential contest."

It compares Mr. Bryan with Mr. Gladstone, declaring that "the former's policy, however humanitarian in its intention, would entail an American Majuba." It declares that "England's deepest hopes are pledged for McKinley's apparently assured success."

The Daily Graphic observes: "We can but regret that there is little prospect that Bryanism has been finally smashed."
