

TO KEEP A HOUSE COOL.

Few Ways in Which the Discomforts The first sultry days suggest to the practical housekeeper the necessity of resorting to various means to reduce the heat within doors. The living rooms should be darkened early in the morning and kept so until the air has become cooled by sunset. Strict adherence to this rule will perceptibly reduce the temperature of a house. Air the rooms morning and night, and sedulously shut out the hot air of midday. These directions would be too

commonplace to repeat if they were not so often ignored and forgoiten. Careful housekeepers take advantage n hot weather of the excellent gas and gasoline stoves, which supply all the heat necessary for cooking and for laundry work, and do not heat up the house. The cost of cooking by gas has been reduced by practical experiments to so low a figure that it has been proved to be a matter of small momen

f ordinary care is exercised. The use of cold meats, iced soups and obstantial foods in a chilled state is a mistake. These dishes are more digestible when eaten hot. At no season of the year is there such a strain upon the strength or are the vital powers s likely to be depressed as during the heated term. What is needed is stimulating, delicately flavored soups, light meats, refreshing fruits and dainty cold deserts. Cold meats are more difficult to digest than hot, and are therefore unfit for summer use unless they are served in salads with condiments to assist digestion. Curries now come into use. Meats served in curry are not only digestible, but stimulate the appetite, giving the tone to digestion so often wanting in hot weather. Ice cream and all delicate deserts that are properly served cold are digestible because they are of light, digestible material.

It is an absurdity to serve a consomme cold, because, from its nature, consomme should be jelly and not a tiquid, when cold. A consomme that remains a liquid is too watery to be of

value as food.

There is a tendency in summer to quench thirst by over-copious draughts of ice water and the various cooling effervescent drinks. This is a bad hal it, and one children are apt to acquire, as well as older people, if they are allowed to do so. It is a matter of habtt, which can be easily overcome. When the summer food is of the proper kind, and a sufficient amount of fresh ripe fruit is used, there will be less desire to quaff ice water in the abund-ant quantities with which so many

mericans accompany their meals.

The lights of the house are often a great source of heat, and they also at-tract night insects. It is always a desirable thing to dispense with powerful burners and lamps as much as possble in summer, and return to the mall lamp and the primitive but picturesque candle. Stains and finger marks may be removed from a looking-glass by rebbing with a soft cloth wet with alcohol.

Discolored ivory may be restored to its original whiteness by soaking it in water and while wet inclosing it in a glass jar nd exposing it to the strong rays of the sun. Repeat the process until the ivory is bleached.

China which has become discolored should be treated to a thorough scouring with coal ashes.

Marble is best cleaned with the following mixture: Four tablespoonfuls of baking soda, two of pumicestone and two of precipitated chalk. Add water until these ingredients are of a paste consistency. Rub preparation on marble, then wash it off with tepid soapsuds.

Bric-a-brac is generally in a dingy condition at the end of winter. If it is gummy, rub with dry salt or baking soda. A strong solution of ammonia and water will clean a piece of bric-abrac thoroughly if an old toothbrush is vigorously used in immersing the article in the solution.

ERRERRESS That clothes are perfectly clean and free from dust is the first requisite for their preservation against the dissolute moth, common garden or "Buffalo" variety.

Blankets should be washed carefully and aired in the sun for two or three hours and then put away with each fold filled with camphor in chests lined with white shelf-paper.

Furs placed in tar paper bags and hung up in a roomy closet, with crushed camphor placed in the pockets, will defy the greatest moth gourmnd if every now and then during the season they are taken out and aired.

Woollen goods and silk articles may be prevented from turning yellow by placing pieces of bees wax about the goods. Silk fabrics should never be kept folded for any length of time in white paper, as the chloride of lime in the paper will impair the color of the

To prevent creasing lay newspapers without opening in the folds of the goods and fold them up together. Laces and fine white goods should be folded in blue paper. This prevents their turning darker.

Mud stains should be allowed to dry, then thoroughly brushed with a dry cloth and the spats removed by

dry cloth and the spots removed by rubbing with alcohol. Grease stains are eradicated most ef-

fectually with benzine. The liquid should be rubbed back and forth over the stain until it has disappeared. It will not then leave a ring. On silverware, stains require prompt

attention, or they take too long to remove. Sulphuric acid will remove the stain left by medicine. Dip the spoor in the acid, repeating the process un-til it has disappeared, then wash it in very hot water. To remove egg stain from silver rub it with table salt. Ink stains on furniture use this: Add six drops of niter to a teas of water and apply to the ink stain with a feather. If the ink does not wield to this, make mixture stronger

and repeat process. On carpets, grease or gummy dirt stains may be removed by rubbing on them the following mixture: One bar of good soap to two teaspoonfuls of sal-soda and saltpeter and four quarts of boiling water. When cool add six ounces of aqua-ammonia. Bottle and use as required.

On pictures, soap should never be used. Wash the painting gently with slear warm water, dry with a piece of sheese-cloth, then rub it with a clean sloth saturated with olive oil.
