They had been taunted with being shopkeepers like the Dutch, but they were soldiers also, like the French, and combined military and commercial genius. They must never permit the Empire to be impaired by incompetence, ignorance, or negligence.

Language the Other Pillar.

The other pillar of the Empire was language. If the great Empire is to leaven the world she must have a language. If the great Empire is to leaven the world she must have a language and speech to express all the noble thoughts laid up in her bosom. It had gradually built itself up into the greatest tongue in the world to-day. It had all the advantages of its predecessors and all the milk and cream of its contemporaries. Telegraphers saved 25 per cent. in using English. The Anglo-Saxon globe-trotter had carried it into the corners of the earth. The Bishop had traveled himself and in fifty hotels had stayed at only one where English was not spoken.

Fifth in rank at the beginning of the last century, the language was first at the beginning of this. It was the tongue of Shakespeare and Milton, and of the glorious literature of the age of Queen Anne. It was the speech of Tennyson, and though it might provoke a smile, the language of Kipling, who not only warbled the ballads of Tommy Atkins, but gave us the incomparable Recessional, bringing us into glorious communion and worshipful acknowledgment of the great God of all.
