AT THE EAU

Many Changes and Improvements
Noted There This Year—Ready
For Cottagers.

The agnostic who claimed, taking questionable liberty with Holy Writ, that the world is the same yesterday, to-day and to-morrow, didn't know the world of Erian. That popular report has been all turned around. A huge coal hoist larger than the first one has been erected paralleling the old hoist. The dredge Ontario arrived Saturday and will at once begin to dredge out the slip. The old slip will be extended and made over 200 feet longer. The spiles protecting this work are rapidly being driven, four spile drivers being employed in the work. The Pere Marquette and Beaufort boats were in yesterday with a load of coal. Instead of bringing the coal over in cars the company this year are shipping their coal in freight boats. The coal is being piled in the same spot as last year. The track has been raised nearly two feet all across the marsh. About 100 Italians are working at this task. They are camped in two freight cars that have been placed at the west end of the bar. Sunday was wash day and they had all their linen on the fence to dry. Everything looks bright and busy around the Eau. The station, dancing platform, bath house, pavilion and bungalow have all been moved and just been moved across the bar to the lake shore from where it stood last year. The other buildings have been placed still further west, but more of them are not as yet been laid into the station and the walks have not yet been made. The buildings look bright and show up better. The result is that the bar now looks very much built up.

THE KITCHEN.

Schemes by Which it May Be Made a Place of Beauty.

The keynote of decoration for a pretty kitchen is often found in the colors of its uniform collection of pots and pans.

These may be hung from under a high shelf placed over the chimney piece at the back of the range, the chimney being painted to imitate bricks outlined in white.

In a kitchen in which the walls are a light fresh green the chimney piece is painted a strong red and hung with copper saucepans and kettles and frying pans.

In another the walls are painted yellow, and the chimney piece is done in white enamel with outlines of blue put on in four inch squares. Two or three shelves over this space hold blue and white jars and bakery and spice holders. Kettles and pans of blue enamel ware with white interiors swing from the lower white shelf, all within easy reach, and blue and white cotton is used both for curtains and table cover.

Fresh and light is a brown and white kitchen, with walls, woodwork and shelves painted in white, and in which brown colonnade is used. It plays the double role of ornamentation and utility. Brown and white linoleum is on the floor, and the gayest of gay chintz curtains are at the windows, with the ruffled cover in the seat of the rocking chair to match. A set of Dutch shelves is covered with heavy but highly colored old fashioned plates and cups which are in constant use as well as being prettily effective as part of the color scheme.

TO HONOR "BOBS"

Little General the Guest of Club in London—Unbroken Tide of Victory.

London, June 19.—General Lord Roberts was the recipient of a striking tribute as the guest of the evening at the second annual dinner of the Pilgrims' Club held here last night. Many famous Englishmen and well known Americans were present to do honor to the "Great Little General," who is president of the British branch of the Pilgrims' Club. Ambassador Choate presided, and in proposing the King's health, said King Edward was the steadfast friend of the United States under all circumstances.

In giving the toast of the evening, Ambassador Choate dilated upon Lord Roberts' accomplishments in the cause of peace, and described him as "one of those who had seen and grown tired of the horrors of war, and who now was one of the great apostles of mediation and arbitration rather than an advocate of a horrid resort to the sword."

"Yet," said Mr. Choate, "for him long years of fortune and genius have united to make for Earl Roberts an unbroken progress of victory and success. From second lieutenant to Earl and Knight of the Garter, from the most subordinate position to that of Commander-in-Chief, from the capture of Delhi and the relief of Lucknow to the relief of Kimberley, his career has been one unbroken tide of victory and success. The relief of Kimberley might have been the relief of London. I thought until that day that an English crowd was cold as compared with an American crowd. My eyes were opened, and I learned that their hearts beat with as warm a feeling as those of any people on the globe."

"In my official and personal capacity, I warmly invite Earl Roberts to come to the United States and pay us a visit. He will be given such a reception as no Englishman ever received. I would like to be present at that first interview in the White House when Lord Roberts and that younger soldier, Roosevelt, meet. That day, I am sure, public business will be suspended, and Lord Roberts President Roosevelt will sit cheek by jowl from the rising to the setting sun, exchanging views on war; but let Lord Roberts go as an apostle of peace and Anglo-American harmony and of the great doctrine of arbitration."

Earl Roberts modestly replied. He said he hoped to be able to visit the United States at no distant date, and echoed the Ambassador's tribute to the work accomplished by the Pilgrims' Club in promoting good feeling between Great Britain and America, saying that both countries owed a deep debt of gratitude for the inauguration of the club.

SPLENDID SERVICES

The anniversary services of the Eighth Line Methodist Church, of Raleigh, were held last Sunday morning and evening, when Rev. W. E. Kerr preached twice to very large congregations. Last evening the anniversary tea was given by the ladies of the church and the basement where the tables were served, and the people of the church were packed with body. The ladies of this church certainly know how to manage a tea meeting and the array of good things provided were fit enough for the King. It was a very pleasant and successful tea. The splendid new church, which was erected two or three years ago, is now free from debt, and Rev. R. Thompson, the energetic and popular pastor, is at the head of one of the best working churches in the county.

After the tea, which was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone, the people assembled in the church, where an excellent program was given. It was provided by a concert company from Chatham, consisting of Mrs. John Cooper, Miss McKellar, Miss Lillian Pratt, Miss Flossie Bogart, M. Shelton, Miss Smith, J. W. Wilson, and R. W. Angus. The program consisted of solos by different members of the company, mixed quartettes by Mrs. Cooper, Miss McKellar, and Messrs. Wilson and Angus; male quartettes, by Messrs. Wilson, Shelton, Smith and Angus; duets, etc. Miss Edna Harkin, who is visiting in Raleigh, also gave a number of excellent recitations. Rev. Mr. Cobledick, Rev. Mr. Mellett and Mr. McArthur, of Chatham, were also present and delivered addresses. Rev. Mr. Thompson presided and he makes a capital chairman. Everyone was delighted with the program and several of the audience took occasion to personally compliment the singers at the conclusion of the program.
