

Local and other Matters.

COMMUNICATIONS and other matters crowded out this week.

The agony is over—the Mackenzie Government resigned yesterday.

SKATING RINK.—A company has been organized at Shediac to build a skating rink there.

The Rev. Mr. Temple of Amherst will occupy the pulpit of the Sackville Methodist Church, next Lord's Day at 11 a. m.

The arrivals at the Fredericton Exhibition are beyond all precedent in the history of exhibitions in New Brunswick.

An Afghan war has commenced. It is said English troops have captured two towns. Several tribes have joined the English.

Mr. Toland, agent of the British and Foreign Bible Society, will hold a meeting in the new hall, Middle Sackville, on Thursday evening, 17th inst.

PARAGONS next Sabbath at Cookville at 10 a. m.; Glax Brook at 8 p. m.; Westport at 6; Woodport at 2 1/2. Rev. Dr. Pickard will preach at Fairfield at 2 1/2.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—At Hillsboro' on Saturday a little girl of 18 years, named Crandall, while playing with some other children on the railway track at Hillsboro', was crushed so badly across the hips that she died instantly.

The consecration of the new Episcopal Church, at Moncton, took place on Tuesday. There was Divine Service and Confirmation in the evening at 7 30 o'clock. Sixteen of the clergy were present. His Lordship the Bishop was the guest of Judge Botsford.

The annual meeting of the Sackville branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society will be held in the Methodist Church, on Wednesday evening 16th inst., at 7 o'clock. Mr. Toland, agent of the Society, will address the meeting. Other addresses may also be expected.

The Missionary Anniversary under the auspices of the Sackville branch of the Methodist Missionary Society will be held next Sabbath at 7 p. m. Addresses on the subject of Christian Missions will be delivered by the chairman, Dr. Inch, and Revs. Dr. Pickard, R. A. Temple, and B. Longley, A. M. Collections will be taken in the morning and evening. His Lordship the Bishop was the guest of the Society.

CAPT. CHARLES McGRUBOR, of Upper Mills, St. Stephen, was found in the field about a quarter of mile back of his residence, on Sunday morning, dead, with a bullet in the side of his head. He was lying on his back, the right hand holding a pistol. He was 34 years of age. An inquest was held on Sunday afternoon by Coroner Rose, and the jury returned a verdict of "came to his death by a pistol shot by his own hand."

CHILD BURNED TO DEATH in Rockland.—On Sunday evening, the house of Robert Smith, at Rockland, was burned down, and, to relate, a young child of Mr. Smith was burned to death in it, and another was also seriously burned. We have not been able to learn the full particulars, but we believe that the fire was set by the young children upsetting a burning lamp, and before assistance could be rendered, it was too late to save one of the children.—Moncton Times.

Vessel and crew towed into Apple River by an American schooner.—The Rink is being built opposite Barry's carriage shop. Office seekers and holders are in a state of suspense.—The Reform Club is in a prosperous condition. Judge Young of P. E. I., delivered a very interesting address at the Club meeting on Thursday.—Diphtheria has entirely disappeared.

Opening of the Methodist Church at Fairfield.

We congratulate the Methodist people of Fairfield on the opening of their new Church which was dedicated on Sabbath last, October 6th. Rev. Dr. Stewart preached the Dedication Sermon. At eleven o'clock the little church was comfortably filled, and Dr. Stewart opened the service according to the form prescribed in the "Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada." The text chosen for this occasion was Matt. 16: 13-27. Attention was particularly directed to the 18th verse. "And I say unto thee that thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build my Church and the gates of Hell shall not prevail against it." While the discourse contained a clear and most admirable exposition of this difficult and much contested passage, it was also replete with plain practical lessons, so earnestly and beautifully put as to chain the attention of the congregation. Dr. Pickard read the Dedication Service. Beside the above named gentlemen, Rev. Mr. Kennedy, Principal of the Ladies' Academy, Rev. H. J. Clarke, Superintendent of the Circuit, and Rev. W. A. Black took part in the service.

At 2 30 p. m., the church was crowded far beyond its seating capacity. Rev. Prof. Burwash, A. M., in opening the service gave out a hymn and offered prayer. Another hymn was sung after which Rev. B. Longley, B. A., Principal of Male Academy, held the congregation spell-bound for nearly an hour. A most eloquent address founded on Rom. xi: 36. The sermon was rich in thought,—full of simple and beautiful imagery,—replete with poetical imagery, and closed with an earnest appeal.

It was feared that the rainy state of the afternoon would prevent the congregation from gathering for the third service of the day. But a very respectable number assembled. Some disappointment was occasioned by the absence of most of those expected to address the meeting. This, however, gave more time to our popular friend, Rev. Prof. Burwash, who gave a very interesting sketch of the history of Methodism in Canada.

Rev. Mr. Clarke then informed the congregation that the beautiful cushion for the Bible was the donation of Mrs. Charles Allison. The pulpit was presented by Dr. Pickard; the carpet for the altar, by Mrs. Josiah Wood; the Bible and Hymn Book, by Miss Wood; the plate in silver, by Mr. W. A. Black; the window in the gable, by Mr. Amos Ogden; the stoves, one by C. Fawcett, Esq.; the other by E. Cogswell, Esq.; pine lumber for the arched ceiling, by J. Humphrey, Esq., of the Methodist Missionary Society; a set of deeply felt gratitude for the sympathy and generosity of the people of Sackville.

The church will seat about one hundred and sixty people, is beautifully situated, and, for a country church, is one of the best in the province. Mr. Clarke has been indefatigable in his labors and certainly deserves great credit for his perseverance. To him, and all who assist him in the Fairfield pulpit, we wish every success.

It is considered by parties who know that the Jersey stock will be maintained on the Jersey stock, but that the sheep averaged fair prices and paid expenses. The Jerseys are the first imported into this Province by the Board. The sheep are very fine, the best that ever came to Nova Scotia from P. E. Island.
