## FROM SOUTH AFRICA.

Boers Wreck a Train and Several Gordon Highlanders Lose Their Lives.

British Run Against Beyer's Command and Administer a Severe Drubbing.

### THE GENERAL SITUATION.

LONDON, July 5.—The British transport Montfort, with 1,000 troops from the Cape abroad, was ashore on the Isle of Wight and was later floated without damage.

**Boers Wreck Train**  
LONDON, July 5.—Lord Kitchener cables the war office from Pretoria that a train from Potersburg was wrecked by the Boers north of Nalomspruit. A lieutenant and

nine men of the Gordon Highlanders were killed, besides an artilleryman engine driver, freeman, guard and four natives.

**Boers Captured**  
Lord Kitchener telegraphed to the war office under date of Pretoria, July 4, as follows: Greenfield, on July 1, at Howell, captured 91 Boers and a lot of supplies belonging to Beyer's command.

### E. A. SMALL DROWNED

Proprietor of Eli Reform Wardrobe, Montreal, Meets a Sad Fate

MONTREAL, July 5.—Word has just been received in the city that E. A. Small, the proprietor of the wholesale clothing establishment of E. A. Small & Co., and the Eli Reform Wardrobe establishment, has been drowned in a lake in the Laurentian district, at Metapedia, where he had been fishing.

### J. W. BELL DEAD.

The Member of Parliament for Addington, Ontario, Succumbs to Paralysis.

NAPLES, July 5.—J. W. Bell, M. P. for Addington, who suffered a stroke of paralysis a few days ago, died at his home at Desamond before noon today. He was 65 years of age.

### POLITICAL RUMORS.

It is Said That Mr. Tarte Will Take the Portfolio of Railways and Canals.

OTTAWA, July 5.—The rumor is current that Blair will leave the department of Railways and Canals in the autumn and Mr. Tarte will take charge of that portfolio and carry out his transportation scheme. Mr. Sutherland is mentioned for public works.

### OIL FEVER GROWING.

Well at Memramcook Flows Steady—No Torpedo Work Yet.

DORCHESTER, July 4.—The oil excitement in the section is increasing and today the well was visited by a number of our citizens. During their stay they witnessed the pumping of four barrels of crude petroleum of a quality that is said to be first class. The well flows steadily and when not pumped at times the oil comes to the surface through the pipes. There is a strong and steady rush of natural gas. A small pump has been inserted with a two and a half inch cylinder. The arrangements for carrying for the oil are very imperfect and the operators are contenting themselves with merely preventing the waste from overflowing. They have not yet torpedoed the hole. There is a difficulty in securing the nitro glycerine material for the purpose. The dangerous character of the liquid makes it very awkward to procure. It is said that those directing operations will visit the scene to monitor and determine on a plan of action and to make arrangements to secure storage of the oil. Expectations respecting the development of this enterprise run high. It is contemplated to sink other wells immediately.

### VESSEL BLOWN UP.

COPENHAGEN, July 5.—The Danish schooner Anna, laden with naptha, while proceeding through the Kattegat yesterday, was shattered by the explosion of her cargo. Seven men were killed and only one of those on board was saved.
