LOOKING FOR NEW ROUTE

Line Between Chipman and Boiestown Said to Be Too Circuitous

Ottawa May 15.—Two new trial lines are to be surveyed in New Brunswick in connection with the National Transcontinental Railway. One is from Chipman to Boiestown and the other between Canaan River and Moncton, north of the St. John division of the Intercolonial Railway.

In the case of the line between Chipman and Boiestown, the one already surveyed, is very circuitous makes a wide detour and it is thought that a more direct route can be obtained. In the case of the other it is probable that a satisfactory line will be obtained to the south of the height of land which extends for some distance. The road will open up a fine agricultural country.

Meeting of The Restigouche Woodworking Co. Ltd.

THE DIRECTORS.

Restigouche and Bonaventure S. S. Association Convention.

DALHOUSIE, N. B., May 17.—The Restigouche Woodworking Company, Limited, held their first regular meeting on Monday, 15th inst. The following officers were appointed, viz: W. S. Montgomery, R. Y. Blackhall, Geo. E. Mercier, David Richards, A. J. LeBlanc, Directors; W. S. Montgomery, President and Manager; Geo. E. Mercier, Vice-President; R. Y. Blackhall, Sec.-Treas.; F. S. Blais, Auditor; Gilbert Leveille, Superintendent of Works. This company will be ready in a few days to manufacture doors, sashes, sheathing, flooring and all other materials required for houses, store and church furnishings.

Their main factory is 150 by 54 feet, their dry house 130x36, Warehouse and office combined, 130x30, boiler house and engine house separate from the three other buildings are two fine structures of brick 20x40. These places occupy a very prominent position and are situated on William Street which is the main business street of the town, and Rock Island Street. They are conveniently situated to the I. C. R. wharf and station. They are now building a vault in their office and the front of their office will be all of plate glass. The amount spent so far is about \$3,000. They expect to employ on an average of 50 men during the year.

W. S. Montgomery received today a gasoline launch for the collecting of fish on the Restigouche and Bay Chaleur. The boat is a very fine one. It was built in Newcastle and the machinery was purchased by Mr. Montgomery at the St. Louis Fair.

A public meeting will be held in the Court House, Dalhousie, on Monday evening 22nd inst., to consider the water question.

Mr. Charles Marcell, M. P. for Bonaventure County, is speaking of building a cottage at Carleton, P. Q. This place is situated 12 miles from Dalhousie, and is a fine summer resort.

Mr. Andrew Barberie has given a contract to the Restigouche Woodworking Company for the erection of a very fine residence on Adelaide Street, near the Presbyterian Church.

The Restigouche and Bonaventure S. S. Association held its annual convention in the Presbyterian Church here on Tuesday and Wednesday. Besides a large number of delegates from different parts of Restigouche County there were several present from New Carlisle, New Richmond and Escuminac, Bonaventure Co., P. Q. Quite a lengthy programme was carried out. Apart from the reading of minutes, appointing of committees, music and offerings, appointing of Parish and County officers, there were several addresses made by prominent speakers, among others Dr. Bachman who opened the conference.

On Wednesday evening his address was a powerful one. His text was "Save the child and you save the world." Other speakers who were to address the conference are G. C. Tullar, Prof. Brower, J. B. Ganong, Rev. H. F. Thomas and Rev. J. W. Kierstead.

Send Eighty Thousand Fresh Troops to the Front

READY TO ADVANCE

Rear-Admiral Rojestvensky is Still at Honkoke Bay

Gusha Pass, Manchuria, May 15.—Skirmishing continues in the Olouri mountain region on the Russian left, but the fighting is not serious. Calm continues on the Russian right. The Chinese however, report that Field-Marshal Oyama is directing large masses of troops from Fokoman toward Tounziakou, where a concentration is proceeding, and the river is being bridged by pontoons. The Liao river is full of junks, which bring up stores and provisions.

About 80,000 Japanese reinforcements have arrived at the front. The Japanese cavalry in particular has been considerably strengthened. Prisoners say that the Japanese armies are ready to advance when the word is given. During the recent terrible dust storm, which raged three days, the soldiers, tents and horses suffered severely. The Russian troops are fitted out with summer uniforms.

Shanghai May 15.—The customs officials are now carefully scrutinizing all applications for permits to export coal.

Singapore, Straits Settlements, May 15.—Thirteen Russian warships were sighted May 13, off Cape Yarella, about 50 miles north of Kenneth Bay by the steamer Jason, which arrived here to-day.

Tokio May 15 noon.—The government has prohibited the exportation of coal to Saigon. The embargo is to continue so long as the Russian fleet is in Indo-Chinese waters.

In order to protect the mat export trade, the government has adopted a system of inspection and stamping. Penalties are assigned for violations.

New Chang, May 15.—A steamer which arrived here yesterday reported the sinking of a Japanese transport in the Gulf of Chili by a mine. This was almost coincident with the sinking of the Japanese transport Shetsu, which struck a mine May 4 near the Miao Islands at the entrance of the Gulf of Chili and was last reported in a sinking condition, but refusing the assistance of a Chinese merchant ship. New Fortifications for Quebec

Montreal, May 16.—The Dominion government is about to spend something over three million dollars in improvements of the defences of Quebec. New forts are to be built at Beaumont, nine miles east of Quebec on the north shore. These forts will give a sweeping observation of the north and south channels of the St. Lawrence. Plans of the forts are now being prepared by the British war office. Work will be begun on the forts next month. When completed the forts will be armed with long distance guns of the most modern pattern.
