Household Hints.

On a hot day, sugar burned on hot coals, and vinegar boiled with myrrh and sprinkled on the floor and furniture of a sick room, are excellent deodorizers.

On a hot day, one cup of sugar, one cup of milk, one egg, beat the size of an egg, one heaping teaspoonful of cream of tartar, two-thirds teaspoonful of soda, two cups of flour, and flavor with lemon juice.

REMOVING GRASS.—Volatile soap removing paint, grease, spots, etc. Four tablespoonfuls of spirits of hartshorn, four tablespoonfuls of alcohol and one of salt. Shake the whole together in a bottle and apply with a sponge or brush.

SOFT GREYER BREAD.—One cup of sour milk, one cup of molasses, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one teaspoonful of ginger, one teaspoonful of soda, two eggs well beaten, at the last, flour to make a thick batter.

TO COOK ABRAMAGUS.—Cut the asparagus in small pieces, wash, and boil in sufficient water to cover it, in which has been put salt to season it for the table; boil about twenty minutes or until tender; add pepper, butter and a little cream thickened with flour.

RENEWING OLD KID GLOVES.—Make a thick mucilage by boiling a handful of flax seed; add a little dissolved toilet soap; then when the mixture cools, put the gloves on the hand and rub them with a piece of white flannel wet with the mixture. Do not wet the gloves through.

TO CRISP PARLEY.—Wash young bunches very clean in cold water, drain them, and wring them about in a clean cloth until they are quite dry. Place them on a sheet of writing paper and lay on the hearth before a brisk fire keeping the sprigs frequently turned until they are quite crisp. They will be ready in from six to eight minutes.

ANTIDOTE FOR POISON.—If anyone is unfortunate enough to swallow poison of any kind through mistake or otherwise, give immediately two gills of sweet oil. It is an effective antidote to any poison. Anyone with a strong constitution should take twice the quantity. In liquid measure one teaspoonful is one gill.

HAIR RESTORER.—It is said that equal parts of butter and black lead, have been thrown, will restore hair that is prematurely turning gray to its original color. Steep all and saturate the hair once a day. There is nothing injurious in the mixture at any rate, and it is perhaps, worthy of trial.

COLD TONGUE.—Let me tell you an excellent way of preparing tongue to eat cold; season with common salt and saltpeper, brown sugar, a little bay-salt, pepper, cloves, mace and allspice in fine powder; let it stand for two weeks, then take the tongue from the pickle and put it into a small pan and lay some butter on it; cover it up with brown crust and bake slowly till tender that a straw will go through it; put it into a tin mould and press it well, laying in as much of the fat as possible. It will be ready for use after standing forty-eight hours. It must be kept in a cool place.
