Rev. Joseph McCoy, of Egmond ville, on the Subject.

To this place Paul came, and accord ing to his custom he entered the syna-gogue of the Jews and preached Christ. Some of the Jews, and more of the de-wout Greeks believed, and a Church of Christ was founded there. Soon the Apostle was driven from Thessalonica by unbelieving Jews, who stirred up the people in opposition to him, and he went down to Berea. He was very anxious about the prosperity of the little church, as he knew they needed more instruction and encouragement. So after his departure he wrote to them letters to complete what he had begun in person. His great care was that these Christians, surrounded as they were by so many temptations, and weakened by the force of old evil habits, should overcome these, abstain from all forms of vice, and be-

abstain from all forms of vice, and become sanctified. Regarding them he mays in our text: "For this is the will of God, even your sanctification."

I. What is sanctification? The word is a compound of two Latin words, and means simply the act of making hely, and the condition of holiness so effected. And to avoid confusion we need to ob-serve that the word "holy" is used in scripture in two distinct senses. Accordingly, unless we clearly understand the meaning of the word holy, we shall still misunderstand what sanctification

Holy means sacred, consecrated set enert for some religious use devoted

For example: Ex. 3: 5, where God said to Moses, "The place whereon thou, standest is holy ground." Holy ground certainly means consecrated or devoted ground. It was reserved by God for the time being, as he was then to communicate his will to Moses. No new quality was imparted to the soil, but the locality

place" spoken of, viz: the court of the tabernacle in which the sacrifices was to be offered, and where the priests were to be offered, and where the priests were to be the hallowed meat. Num. 5: 17, speaks of "holy water"

Num. 5: 17, speaks of holy water made in certain cases by the priests, not meaning that the water was possessed of many intrinsic quality differing frem any intrinsic quality differing frem any to womankind. It is almost magical in other water, but water consecrated for the ritualistic service.

Then in Ex. 20: 8, and many other places, we read of the "hely day." Now the quality of the duration is exactly the same on Sabbath as on any other day of the week. If one were out at sea slone in the desert or prairie, and fail to keep count of the days of the week, he could not by any quality of the Sabbath day distinguish it from any other day. What God meant by the command was that the seventh day should be consecrated to his service, and hence a holy

day.

Many other examples of this use of the word holy might be given, as holy garant blue. Pick out your own friends. Those that other people may select for you will not be half so true.—[Uncle Mark. word holy might be given, as holy gar-ments for the priests, holy beasts for eacrifice, holy nation, &c., &c.

Free from sin. It is a moral quality, and can belong therefore only to moral beings. For this use of the word refer to such passages as Lev. 19: 2, which is quoted in 1 Pet. 1: 16: "Be ye holy for I am holy;" John 17: 11, when the epithet is applied by Jesus to God the Father; Col. 1:22. In this latter reference we find it associated with the words "unblameable" and "unreproveable."


