

SANCTIFICATION.

Rev. Joseph McCoy, of Egmondville, on the Subject.

Notes of a Sermon Preached in Knox Church, Goderich.

Several months ago, Rev. Joseph McCoy, of Egmondville, preached a sermon on "Sanctification," in Knox church, Goderich.

The story of the founding of the church at Thebesonia is recorded in the 17th chapter of the Acts.

Thebesonia is situated at the head of a beautiful gulf, and so at the terminus of navigation in that part.

To this place Paul came, and according to his custom he entered the synagogue of the Jews and preached Christ.

Some of the Jews, and more of the devout Greeks believed, and a Church of Christ was founded there.

His great care was that these Christians, surrounded as they were by so many temptations, and weakened by the force of old evil habits, should overcome these, abstain from all forms of vice, and become sanctified.

And to avoid confusion we need to observe that the word "holy" is used in scripture in two distinct senses.

1. Holy means sacred, consecrated, set apart for some religious use, devoted to God.

For example: Ex. 3: 5, where God said to Moses, "The place where thou standest is holy ground."

2. Holy means also morally pure, free from sin. It is a moral quality, and can belong therefore only to moral beings.

For this use of the word refer to such passages as Lev. 19: 2, which is quoted in 1 Pet. 1: 16: "Be ye holy for I am holy."

The essential difference between these two meanings is very clear, when we apply the word to Ethics.

Some there are who confound sanctification and justification. They can find no difference between being pardoned and received into the church, and being sanctified.

If we accept of the 1st meaning of "holy" only, then surely there can be little difference between the two things; but if we have regard to the 2nd meaning, which is the real and important meaning of the word, there is a vast difference between justification and sanctification.
