A baby of eighteen months, Frank Warwick, was charged in London, England, under the Children's Act, with wandering, and was carried into court by the matron. The magistrate remarked that it seemed ridiculous to charge one so young, but the police inspector replied that he had had to charge babies under twelve months old. A further remand was ordered. When taken into court on a previous occasion young Frank caught sight of his mother, who is charged with exposing her children in a manner likely to cause them injury, and there was no further peace until he was allowed to cling round her neck. The magistrate thought it absurd to charge children of that age, and ordered them to be sent to the workhouse.

Preserve me from the people who go out of their way and even deny their convictions for the pleasure of disagreeing with you on every possible subject. But equally much, preserve me from the folks who swing the pendulum to the opposite extreme by being fairly fulsome in their acquiescence. I wonder if you know just the kind of people I mean?

Let me elucidate by telling you some of their ways. These folks are so prone to agree with you and so sure they know just what you are going to say that if you pause an instant in your speech, they supply the word for you. Quite frequently it isn't the right word, but politeness forbids, of course, that you should tell them that.

They always gaze intently at you while you are talking, presumably in order to demonstrate their interest more thoroughly. As a natural result of this painfully direct gaze your eyes begin to feel as if you were trying to look into the sun, you feel yourself becoming embarrassed and start looking at the floor, the ceiling, out the window or anywhere to avoid meeting their gaze.

They almost always nod their heads frequently in approval of what you are saying. You ought to be grateful.

but as a matter of fact it irritates you and makes you think of those funny little figures that used to be so popular who nodded their heads frantically at the slightest jar. If you start to quote anything to these folks they promptly join in the quotation, or if they can't quite do that, at least chime in on the last word of every line, like a child whose mother is trying to teach it its first nursery rhyme.

Occasionally they become so enthusiastic in their acquiescence that they interrupt what you have barely begun to say "Yes, I know," and when you have yielded the floor to them, you frequently find that they know something quite different from what you intended to say.

Now, do you recognize them? Talking to such people makes me think of a gymnastic exercise we used to take in which we were instructed to clinch our fists and draw our arms back against the air as if we were really pulling something.

That exercise tired me much more than actually lifting heavy weights. And it seems to me that's the way with talking to these fulsomely acquiescent folks.

It's fighting air, wrestling with a ghost, stepping up when there is no step to take.

Of course, they just do that way because they mean well, but how often does meaning well do any good unless it's preceded by thinking well? And so far as I can see, they entirely omit that part of the program.

### Fads and Fashions.

Delicately colored buttons in soft blues, pinks and purples will be used on silks and chiffons.

For girls' blouses will not be as much favored as stripes and checks with material trimming.

Some of the latest girdles are very wide, six to eight inches in front and three inches less in the back.

It is not thought that the short frock for evening wear will outlast the season, as it lacks elegance.

The fichu is very much in favour and it is certainly a pretty accessory—picturesque, too, and coquettish.

Black velvet sashes are considered very stylish, caught with a diamond buckle, using very lightweight velvet.

The newest Dutch collar closes in the back and has a five-inch pleated jabot over the front from the neck edge.

The ricorne again has a place in millinery, cocked hats according with a decided military tendency in dress.

The latest mode brings in a black velvet evening coat, with sailor collar and cuffs and long, tasseled revers of white satin.

There is a strong rogue for the black-and-white in millinery, and the hat of this type is becoming to every type of beauty.

Spring predictions for tailor-made suits are: Jackets, 26 inches, half-fitting, tight at the hips, plain sleeves, broad collar, narrow and straight.

Some of the new shawl-shaped

styles are made of a new material, very much like plush, and they are usually seen in the soft taupe shades.

Draped models are extensively used for evening gowns. The tunic is crossed or disposed in irregular folds; it is twisted and turned in curious ways.

In the new satins and crepes many of the delicate intricate designs of the odd evening shawls are given in contrasting tones by the weave of the material.

Many of the best-dressed people are carrying large bags of rich material, each with lots of gold about it, slung from very long gold cords, reaching nearly to their boots.

Kilted skirts are promises for girls' wear again; also kilted flounces under one-piece loose frocks. Another idea is the "band" flounce trimming on girl's dresses of plain material.

Chiffon cloth in all colors, bordered on three or on all four sides with marabout, is the practical winter veil. Marabout matches or contrasts with the veil; either being attractive.

Automobile veils are of chiffon cloth, fine marquisette or grenadine with plain or printed borders, in ribbon effects. It is now the fad to use the kinds that are waterproof.

**ENGLAND'S FIRST RAILROAD.**  
The travelling on the first railroad in England was not very comfortable undoubtedly. The coaches were at first only coupled with chains, as wagons are now; so that they jerked the unfortunate passengers nearly off their seats at starting and clasped violently against each other when the driver put on his brake.
