### How Our Laws Are Enforced.

Appended will be found two interesting cases of how our laws are enforced. Recently some fishermen at Lark Harbor lodged a complaint with the authorities of that place that some parties were catching and canning lobsters in close season. Constable Quimlan was despatched to work on the case and succeeded in catching four men, belonging to Frenchman's Cove operating during the prohibited season at Wild Cove. The accused were brought before Magistrate March at Curling. They pleaded guilty and were let go on suspended sentence. On Sept. 6th, a breach of the Game Laws occurred at Grand Lake. Warden Squires visited Goose Brook at ten o'clock in the night, finding a net across the brook, but could not see anyone around. Later the warden found a trolley on the track. The Game Warden being aware that this trolley was used by one Hicks, summoned the latter. The case was tried before Magistrate March at Curling. Circumstantial evidence showed that Hicks loaned the trolley to another man on the night in question, but notwithstanding, Hicks was fined \$40 and costs, which amounted to \$48.50.

### Cable News.

New York, To-day. Timothy L. Woodruff, former Lieut. Governor of New York, was stricken last night just as he concluded an address at Fiston Ratification Meeting. Physicians announced he had suffered a stroke of paralysis and his condition is serious.

Vienna, To-day. According to reports received here Albanians captured Jakova only after heavy fighting. Prisoned, few miles south, surrounded by Albanians, its fall hourly expected. Servian garrison there consists of 60,000 men. New Avlona on Adriatic Sea states Albanians captured Ochrida after a fierce engagement.

London, To-day. A Constantinople dispatch says Hessa Pasha telegraphed Sultan he intends to form autonomous Albania under suzerainty of Turkey. Grand Vizier congratulated delegates on the completion of their work for peace. General Savoff, Bulgarian delegate, replying, said treaty marked resumption of relations of concord and friendship between Turkey and Bulgaria.

Pisa, Italy, To-day. The Chamber of Deputies has dissolved and the general elections will take place at the end of October. The Cabinet statement which will be issued will probably indicate pacification of Libya by Italy almost complete, and declares the time is approaching when it will be the aim of Italian peasants to emigrate there under the protection of the Fatherland instead of to foreign countries.

New York, To-day. For more than three months from about the middle of December to March, Theodore Roosevelt will be buried in the wilds of South America. Roosevelt will sail from New York October 4th and will spend about two months visiting various cities, Brazil, Argentina, Chili and Paraguay. In these countries he will be the Government's guest, and will deliver several formal addresses. Late in December his little river steamer will leave him and his party of Naturalists in Guyaba, Brazil, the head of the navigation on Paraguay River, and at that point the hardships of the journey will begin.

Albany, To-day. Governor Sulzer yesterday won triple victory over his accusers at his trial for impeachment. Presiding Judge Cullen of the High Court barred introduction of evidence to prove Governor had made corrupt political bargain with Assemblyman Patrick Greene; Court held that evidence brought forward should be made similar bargains with other Assemblymen, statement campaign receipts, and more evidence concerning Governor's alleged Wall Street speculations. Assembly Managers and their case was announced with calling possibly two more witnesses. To-day case against Governor would probably be completed.

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### The Irish Question.

London, To-day. John E. Redmond by his speech yesterday virtually killed any prospects of the settlement of the Home Rule crisis by consent. The Irish Nationalist Leader's speech is the first pronouncement since the publication of Loreburn's letter suggesting a conference, for that reason it was awaited with no little anxiety by his followers. The moderation of his speeches in Parliament has on occasion been a source of criticism among the straiter sect of Nationalists who may well have anticipated that they would offer at least a small olive branch on the Loreburn altar. All such fears or hopes, as the case may be, were falsified by his speech yesterday.
