

ST. PIERRE BULLETIN. PARIS, via St. Pierre, April 19. In Belgium, the British troops captured near Zwartelene, 200 metres of trench, and successfully held on to the same in spite of several counterattacks. We have been victorious on both

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banks of the River Fecht in Alsace, and have advanced on the left banks. We took possession S.W. of Schil les Kerswassen, of Burakorpsfeld summit, which commands a direct view of the Valley on the right banks.

In Schneefaurieth district, we propressed remarkably, our troops advancing northward in the direction of the Fecht and Metzeral. In this district we scored important success and occupied a series of heights of which the northern one commands the Fecht's course, opposite Burgkorpfeld.


