PLAYING SECOND BASE.
(Continued.)
To the young second baseman I cannot do better than say: "Play second base as on the theory that Huggins employed as outlined in Tuesday's column. Take up a position as far behind the bag and towards centre field as you safely can. Keep the bag in front of you and as many plays as possible between you and the first baseman." Huggins made play at second base a picnic. When touching a runner always try and make him slide in front of you so that you can see him as you reach to touch him. So, when taking a throw from the catcher on a steal stand behind fairly astride of the base and make the runner slide in front of you. Never let the runner slide in behind you if you can help it. Whenever a ball is hit to left field move to the inside corner of and stand on the base. Make all runners go around you. If the ball is hit to right field you may have to go out and help to relay it into the diamond. In this case the shortstop must cover the base. Always see that all bases are covered. Chase all flies anywhere near your position to the end. Never give up a fly ball till it hits the ground. Stand behind, not in front of the base when taking throws from the catcher. Throw underhand on all short throws to the first and second baseman. Throw overhand on doubleplay to the first sacker.

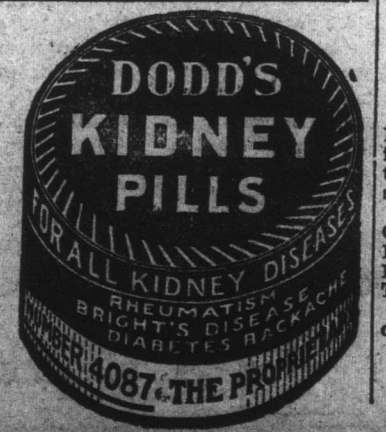
Shipping Notes.
