Creates Discord**

WEIMAR, Germany, March 23 (A. A.)—Completion recently of Germany's largest church bell has brought about much discord in certain political circles. The Monarchists insist upon calling it the "Kaiser's bell," while the Republicans have given it the name of "The bell of the Rhine."

The bell was cast here for the famous Cathedral of Cologne, but there have been repeated delays in shipment, according to German authorities, because it was feared it might be confiscated by the French.
