Earth Slide at Dry Dock

OPERATIONS UNINTERRUPTED.

Owing to the pressure of water
from the river on the south side of
the Government Railway Freight
Sheds, the ground at the top of the
dock where excavation work is going
on, founded on Saturday morning,
and about forty tons of silt dropped
into the basin below. The cave-in
occurred on the southern side just
immediately east from the end of the
completed wall. According as the
work progressed, water commenced
to pour in at the place from the out-
side, and to prevent an earth slide
the foreman of construction work
had piles driven along the side of
the dock, and stayed by cables. Later
in the afternoon the cables parted
with the result that another cave-in
occurred near the old gate. The em-
ployees were back on the job yester-
day, and the work of removing the
silt was completed before dark. The
freight shed on the southern side
has been moved slightly from its
foundation. A rumor that the shed
collapsed when the cave-in occurred,
is incorrect.

BRAZILIAN.

Growth of Ten Years—Great Future

Before It.

"Buying of public utility stocks has
doubled and trebled values during the
past year, but it is only quite recently
that investors have awakened to the
