

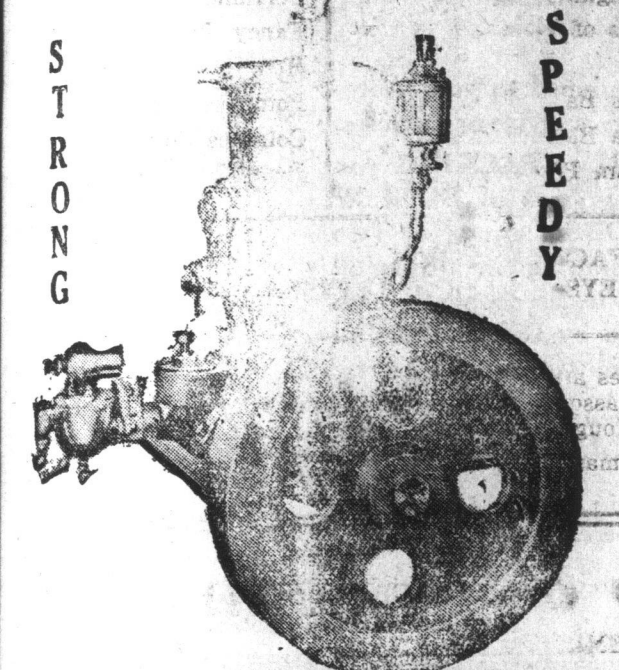

RENAULT WON.

ST. LOUIS, Dec. 2.—Jack Renault, recognized Canadian champion, scored a technical knockout over Sergeant Jack Adams, heavyweight champion of the United States Army, in the fifth round of their scheduled ten-round bout here last night. The referee stopped the fight thirty seconds before the end of the fifth round and declared Renault the victor. Adams went down twice in the second round for a count of nine.

WILL FIGHT FOR EXPENSES.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Lucien Vinez, of France, lightweight champion of Europe, is willing to fight for nothing if he can win a title. His extraordinary proposition was accepted by promoters of the Christmas Fund, boxing December 23, and he will meet Jimmy Goodrich, of Buffalo, recognized as world's champion, in a 15 round engagement. Vinez will take only a crown back to Europe if he wins and if he loses his reward will be a mere one thousand dollars for training expenses. Goodrich will receive about ten thousand dollars if he wins and slightly more if he loses, under the agreement.

BOAT FOR SOLDIER JONES.

TORONTO, Dec. 1 (Can Press).—Arrangements have been completed between Soldier Jones, light heavyweight fighter of Toronto, and Paolino, heavyweight champion of Spain, for a contest at Barcelona, Spain, on December 8, states a message which has been received here. Paolino was matched to fight Marcel Nilles, the French heavyweight, at Paris, on this date, but the French fighter withdrew from the contest when the promoter shipped it from the French capital to Barcelona. He refused to make the trip to Spain.
