

Mr. Motley's Instructions.

Mr. Forney in a despatch which he sent from Washington to the Philadelphia Press, a few days ago, gives the following as the instructions under which Mr. Motley is to act. If they could be credited as correct, the American Minister will be a terrible fellow to deal with if he is not handled tenderly:

"The Government is in daily expectation of news of the presentation of Minister Motley to the Queen. His time thus far since his arrival in Great Britain has been occupied in arranging matters of a personal character, and it is understood that he is now ready to make his formal appearance at Court. When presented it is well known that his remarks will embrace a mere repetition of the stereotyped speech regarding peace, good will, &c., which custom renders conventional on such occasions. Subsequently, he is instructed to conclude the negotiations of the consular and naturalization treaties, and, if a favorable opportunity affords itself, re-open the question of the Alabama claims. His first duty in respect to the latter subject will be an attempt to transfer all future negotiations to this side of the Atlantic. With this object in view he will suggest to the English government that America having attempted to negotiate the settlement by appeals to its Court, has made a significant advance towards the solution of the pending difficulties, which should properly be met by a reciprocal attempt on the part of Great Britain. Pending this attempt to shift the scene of negotiations, he is instructed to sink the matters of dollars and cents, which was constantly uppermost in the mind of his predecessor, Reverdy Johnson, and persistently insist that the main question involved is the alleged wrong inflicted on this government by the proclamation issued by the Queen, granting belligerent rights to the rebels. At the same time he will explain that the rejection of the Johnson-Clarendon protocol by the United States Senate was not occasioned by objections to what the protocol contained, but rather to what it did not contain, and that our government would willingly accept its terms of settlement of the money claims involved in the differences between us if it also provided for a solution of the great and preponderating question regarding the right of Great Britain to grant belligerent privileges to the South. In this way it is proposed by the Administration to assert the dignity of our government in a matter which will not detract from the late prospects of continued peace between the two countries, and simultaneously demand a more comprehensive consideration of the case than has hitherto been accorded, or, for that matter, requested. Failing in his efforts to obtain a transfer of future attempts at settlement to Washington, Mr. Motley will receive additional instructions. The character of these additional instructions have not yet been determined; but the policy of the Administration is so far matured on the subject that it has no hesitation in predicting a bold declaration of the wrongs suffered by us, which ensued through a prolongation of the rebellion consequent upon the course of Great Britain, and a stern demand for reparation in the form of a retraction of the principle asserted in the Queen's belligerent proclamation.

Paying for being Smeared at.

The scene in the House of Commons last Sunday morning—for the adjournment did not take place until a quarter-past twelve—is said to have been one of the most uproarious and disgraceful that has ever been witnessed there, or at the deliberation of any other legislative body. And what was it all for? Ministers prolonged the debate until sacred time was intruded upon, to fight a battle for men who give thanks for their efforts. In our remarks upon the question of increased subsidy to Nova Scotia, a day or two ago, we expressed doubts as to whether Upper Canadians would be satisfied with being made much longer the prey of the Nova Scotians. We now learn from a reliable source that there is dissatisfaction even in Sir John's wing of the Ministerialists, although Sir George's phalanx remains unbroken, and as willing as ever to obey the dictum of their leader. At the same time we expressed a hope that, since what had been done could not be conveniently undone, the people of Nova Scotia would thank Heaven and the Dominion Government for the good fortune which made them a part of the Union, and be satisfied. But we are further informed that pacification is as far distant as ever, and that the Nova Scotian members have the impudence to sit in the House, and sneer openly at the Dominion and all its interests. Moreover, they openly avow their annexation views, and, with incomprehensible effrontery, assert their intention of taking all the money the Commons will vote them, and then doing their best to break up the Union. Certainly manhood, not to say morality, must be at a low ebb with the Ministerial party when they would condescend to load such ingrates with benefits, and appropriate time which is not theirs in order to carry out the meaningless process.

Anglican Synod.

June 16th. Several notices of motion were given. Some discussion took place with regard to the admission of Mr. Boulton and Dr. McManus, two delegates, but on motion they were admitted members. Reports were received: From the Treasurer and Auditors of the Synod; from the committee for the relief of superannuated clergymen; from the committee on Finance and Assessment; from the committee on contested seats; from the Ven. Archdeacon Fuller on statistical information. After recess Archdeacon Fuller read the new constitution of the Synod submitted by the committee appointed to draft a constitution. The Committee appointed to scrutinize the votes for delegates to Provisional Synod presented the following list:— Clerical Delegates—Canon Beaton, Provost Whittaker, Rev. J. Gamble Gellies, Rev. Canon Brent, Ven. Archdeacon of Toronto, Rev. W. S. Darling, Rev. H. Holland, Rev. J. Cayley, Rev. C. S. Bethune, Rev. J. Carry, Rev. T. T. Roberts, Rev. C. E. Thomson, Lay Delegates—Dr. Bovell, S. B. Harman, Professor Wilson, Hon. H. B. Bull, F. W. Cumberland, Hon. J. H. Cameron, T. W. Gamble, T. C. Street, J. M. Grover, C. T. Campbell, C. Gamble, H. H. Campbell. Rev. Mr. McCollam brought up a motion referring to the management of the Rectories. It was intended by it to give the laity a voice in the management of the Rectories, and the discussion broadened as to whether or not the people should have the right to choose their minister. The High Church party were strongly against this, being headed by Provost Whittaker, and the Low Church men by Prof. Wilson. An amendment

to the motion was moved by Dr. Lett for allowing the patronage to remain in the hands of the Bishops.

THE GUELPH POLICE COURT.

Before T. W. Saunders, Esq., Police Magistrate. -THURSDAY, June 17th. James Walker was charged by the Chief Constable with vagrancy. Case dismissed. Wm. McPadden was charged by Constable Nichols with being drunk and disorderly on Macdonnell-st. As this was the first offence he was dismissed. Mary O'Toole was charged by the Chief Constable with selling liquor without license. The case was adjourned till to-morrow for further evidence.
