THE FLOODS IN ENGLAND.—The late, heavy storms have swollen the streams throughout England to a great height and several of them have everflowed their banks. Windsor and Eton are flooded. The river Trent and its affluents, the Soar and the Derwent, have risen above their banks, submerging a large portion of the country in Leicestershire, Derby, and Nottingham. In some sections of these countres only the tops of the trees and hedges are visible. Heavy land-silides have occurred near Dover, and railway communication with that town is interrupted. The town of Peterborough in Northamptonshire, is flooded, and many of the residents have been compelled to take r-fuge from the water in the upper stories of their dwellings.
