West Toronto Election.

Monday December 8th is to be the nomination day for West Toronto. Mr. E. O. Bickford, the Opposition candidate, says he is willing to retire in favor of a stronger Tory candidate if one should be appointed.

When Mr. Bickford's name was proposed some old stagers shook their heads, but objections crumbled away upon examination, and surprise yielded to conviction.

And a Toronto correspondent says that many Conservatives are not backward in expressing their belief that if West Toronto is to return an Opposition M. P. to Parliament, the present candidate (Bickford) will have to give place to M. C. Cameron or some other prominent member of the party.

Some measure of justice has been dealt to the steamer Murillo, though only in the shape of a pecuniary loss, and falling on the owners. It is to be hoped that the captain is one of these. The case came up before the Court of Admiralty, London, recently.
