NOTES AND COMMENTS.

It is said that one swallow does not make a summer, neither will one crop of sugar beets, raised in an experimental way, definitely solve the problem of beet growing, but it will help the individual to decide whether or not he would favor a trial another year, and farmers who are at all inclined to the plan, should by all means avail themselves of the opportunity of testing the matter as fully as possible. No other crop gives so large direct returns, nor adds so much to the productivity of the soil. Those in the Bay City district who desire to rent farming lands for the present season are finding the lands very much advanced in price and very little to be had even at the advanced prices, and sugar beet growing is the reason. What farmer has a sure crop of every one he puts in, wheat at best is not very profitable, corn is either too good or no good. But with the sugar beet you may have it sold before it is raised. Proper care and cultivation makes this crop more profitable, and this matter is entirely in the hands of the farmer, who may grow without much care a 12 per cent. beet, but with more care you may grow a 15 per cent. beet.

We desire once more to call particular attention to the question of the sugar beet test, which will be made in this section this year. On Thursday, the 26th inst., a meeting will be held in the town hall, here, to which every farmer is invited. It will be addressed by Prof. Shuttleworth, of the Agricultural College, Guelph, who will no doubt give much valuable information, and throw out many good ideas on the cultivation of sugar beets. Circulars have been sent out to a number of farmers in each section, inviting their co-operation. The hall should be full, as this is by long odds the most important question that has ever been before the farmers of Malahide. It must not be treated lightly, as upon the erection of a sugar factory in Aylmer depends the distribution of at least \$250,000.00 annually in this section for sugar beets alone. A sugar factory in Aylmer will increase the value of every farm within ten miles of the town by at least 25 per cent. It will enable the farmer to make \$50 or \$80 an acre, where he does not often make \$10 now. We cannot afford to ignore these facts. Come out on the 26th. The fifty packages of seed will be distributed on that date, particulars of which have already been published several times.

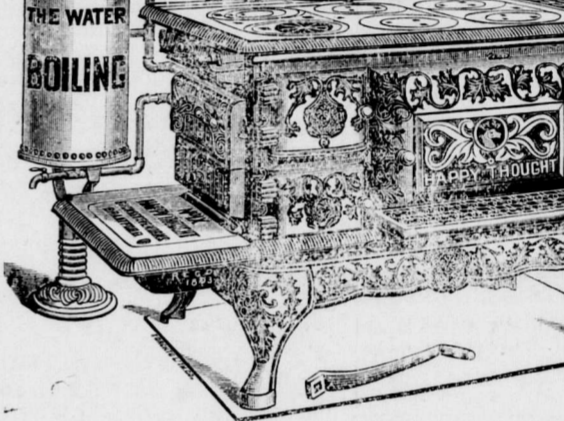
