PARIS, Sept. 14.—Upon the opening of the Bourse here this morning there was a gen-eral weakening of price, due to the report-ed action of Great Britain in landing troops at Sieri

THE LANDING AT SIGRL

CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 14.—A detachment of bluejackets and marines from a British iron-clad, accompanied by a battery British iron-clad, accompanied by a battery of light field pieces and several Gatling guns, was landed yesterday morning at Sigri on the island of Mitylene, formally occupying that place in the name of the Queen of England. There is a good harbor at Sigri and it is supposed the British officers at Mitylene intend to fortify the island and make it a coaling station and rendezvous for the British Mediterranean flect.

DISCREDITED.

An intimation of the intention of the British Government to occupy an island giving a point of vantage near the Dardanelies was first heard of in the inner diplomatic circles of Berlin and Vienna soon after Sir William White's audience with the Sultan on Friday last. Nothing about it, however, appeared in the European newspapers till the Constantinople feports startled the bourse and public to-day. The reports were at first treated as incredible, and are still held to be of doubtful authenticity, or at least exaggerated.

BUT NOT IMPROBABLE.

It can be stated on high authority, however, that Sir William White asked the Sultan to assent to British occupation of some point within striking distance of the Straits, and offering a good harborage for the fleet. The offer made to the Sultan revived the request which the British Government made in 1877, prior to the acquisation of Cyprus, to purchase an island near the Dardanelles. This project was long the subject of negoriations, and was abandoned in the signing of the Anglo-Turkish convention in June, 1878. The seizing of Sigri, therefore, cannot have occurred without the connivance of the Sultan.

Alluding to the Russian plea to seize Constantinople by a coup de main, the Pester Lloyd quotes a document prepared by Czar Nicholas in 1853, minutely detailing plans by which a force of 16,000 infantry and 32 guns could force the passage of the Bosphorus and carry Constantinople. The Pester Lloyd says it has become known from words dropped here and there recently at St. Petersburg that these coup de main prospects have been revived in high official circles there, and that various plans of capturing Constantinople have been discussed in view of their great feasibility owing to the advantage of modern war equipments.

Chandiere Mills Shut Dewn-2,000 Men Idlo.

Ottawa, Sept. 15.—A big strike took place yesterday morning in the Chaudiere lumber mills, about 2,000 men going out. They struck for 50 cents a week raise in their wages and an hour's reduction in their day's labor. Last year the men were getting from \$7 to \$9.50 a week, according to the work, and this year the running wages are from \$6.50 to \$8.50 a week. The strike originated at Perley & Pattee's establishment, where several members of the Knights of Labor engaged in loading deals on the wagons refused to start work.
