THEY WANT THE L. AND P. S. R.

Detroit Capitalists Will Make an Offer for the Lease.

Their Representative Talks About the Offer—The Scheme Includes Steamboat Connection with Cleveland and Montreal.

There is a possibility of the L. and P. S. R. being leased by American capitalists. Engineer Brennan, of Toledo, representing some wealthy Detroit men, is in the city. Yesterday afternoon, with Ald. Coe, he reviewed plans, documents and Engineer Jennings' report respecting the road. In the evening he had an informal meeting with Mayor Estey, ex-Ald. F. E. Leonard and Ald. Parnell, Coe, Taylor, Thos. Jones, Monte, Carrothers, James Fitzgerald and Shaw. The result of this conference was that Mr. Brennan decided to make an offer for the lease of the road on behalf of the capitalists he represents.

SOMETHING ABOUT THE OFFER.

"We cannot make as good an offer as we did last year," Mr. Brennan told an ADVERTISER reporter. "We had several contracts in view then which we cannot get again," he gave as his reason.

"How will your offer compare with that of the Cleveland syndicate," inquired the reporter?

"Oh! That was a ridiculous proposition. Think of paying an annual rental of \$25,000. They must have been boys at the business."

"Do you represent the same men now that you did a year ago?" was asked.

"No, they are entirely different capitalists."

STEAMBOAT CONNECTION.

"No doubt you will have steamboat connection," suggested the scribbler.

"Of course, we will have steamboat connection with both Cleveland and Montreal. The road cannot be made to pay well without these connections. Port Stanley would never grow either, unless the railroad and lake business were combined. We will make an offer for the lease of the road, and if we get it Port Stanley will thrive. As long as the road is run by another railroad company there will be no steamship connection, and that is what is needed to make the road pay."

A TALE OF WOE

Which Appealed to a Sympathetic Windsor Fencer—F. Woodward Arrested in London.

On Wednesday Detectives Rider and Nickle on the strength of a telegram from Windsor arrested a young married man at a temporary home on Talbot street. Chief Wells, of Windsor, arrived yesterday and took him to that place, his wife remaining here. The Windsor Record has this to say of the case:

"A few days ago a man named F. Woodward arrived in the city, accompanied by a young lady whom he introduced as his wife. They secured board at 175 Sandwich street west. Woodward claimed to be looking for work, but was unsuccessful, and after he had boarded the first week he wanted him to settle. He could not do so, and in an endeavor to raise the wind called on Rev. Mr. Vining, of the Bruce Avenue Baptist Church, with his fair tale of woe. At the outset he claimed to be a Baptist, and also a graduate of Yale College, Boston. His father was wealthy, he said, and objected to the son's marriage with the girl of his choice. The young man was determined to marry the young lady, and an elopement was planned. It was successfully carried out, but Woodward was in hard luck and could not obtain work. If he did not pay his board the landlady threatened to turn him out, and so forth and so on. Such was the tale he told, and if Mr. Vining could advance him a few dollars he would repay him with compound interest as soon as he secured work, which had been promised him at the Singer sewing machine office in this city."

"Mr. Vining promised to do what he could for the young man, and the latter promised to address the young people's meeting the following evening. The next day he received the preacher's \$50, but failed to turn up at the meeting to deliver the promised address. In a day or two Woodward commenced work at the Singer office and did fairly well, but sold two or three machines. In the meantime he called on Lambert, the shoe man, and purchased shoes to the extent of about \$7.50. Monday Mr. Woodward skipped and now it transpires that the smooth-tongued Yale young man had done up Aurelie Pacaud to the tune of about \$43 on a sewing machine deal, and it is said he has left several other debts behind. A warrant was sworn out for his arrest on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, and word was received from London last night that Woodward had been arrested in that city."

THE IRON MALL.

Amendments Governing the Management of the Order.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Aug. 3.—The supreme sitting of the Order of the Iron Hall has acted on the report of the committee on law. The section governing the meeting of the supreme sitting was changed so as to make it imperative that the sitting must occur every two years. Under the old rule the sitting did not meet unless the supreme justice called it together. The supreme justice still has power to call a special meeting of the sitting if he deems it expedient.

A change was also made in the section governing the deposit of the funds of the order. By the change each district is to have a depository. The constitution was further changed so as to place women on an equal footing with men in the order. A resolution expressing confidence in the order was passed.

A Boy Kills His Little Sister.

ARLINGTON, Neb., Aug. 3.—The 10-year-old son of Arthur Johnson murdered his 8-year-old sister Tuesday afternoon. The boy said he found a revolver in a bureau drawer and wanted to see what his sister would do if he fired it at her.

Will Welcome Lord Aberdeen.

TORONTO, Aug. 3.—The St. Andrew's Society has decided to offer a special reception and address of welcome to Lord Aberdeen on his arrival. The society is also discussing the idea of forming a Highland battalion or company in Ottawa.

FOR A DOLLAR.

A Man 97 Years Old Nearly Beaten to Death and His Wife Knocked Senseless.

SOMERSET, Pa., Aug. 3.—Last night three masked men entered the residence of Abraham Beam, a retired farmer 97 years of age, and, finding Mr. and Mrs. Beam alone, demanded their money. Mrs. Beam handed them a pocketbook containing less than a dollar. The robbers turned furiously upon the old couple and beat them in a horrible manner. A piece of firewood was forced down Mr. Beam's throat in an effort to extort from him the hiding place of his supposed wealth.

The old gentleman lost consciousness, and the robbers, thinking they had killed him, knocked Mrs. Beam senseless with a club and fled. Mrs. Beam finally recovered and rang the dinner bell to arouse the neighbors, several of whom responded. The physicians say it is doubtful whether Mr. Beam can recover. No trace of the robbers can be found. Mrs. Beam is unable to give a description of the men.

BOTH BOYS DEAD.

Five or Six Tons of Dirt Fell on Them While Playing in a Sand Pit.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Several boys were playing in a sand pit in Trenton last evening, when the bank gave way, and William Lewis and Charles Stout were buried. Both were dead when taken out. Five or six tons of sand and rock had fallen upon them.

Scores of men and boys began to dig for the boys directly that the accident was reported, but work as fast as they could twenty minutes passed before the earth could be lifted off the children.

DEATH BY DROWNING.

Fatal Accidents at Cape Vincent, Rosseau and Other Points.

KINGSTON, Ont., Aug. 3.—There was a sad drowning accident near Cape Vincent, N. Y., Tuesday. While Chas. Jones and his wife and son, 14 years of age, and Mrs. E. Humphrey were fishing at Mud Creek, four miles south of the village, the boy, in attempting to hoist anchor, capsized the boat and both women were drowned. Father and son reached shore with difficulty. The bodies were recovered.

Rosseau, Ont., Aug. 3.—Miss Fleming of Brampton, Ont., was drowned on Wednesday while bathing with a friend at Yarmou Island, near Cleveland's Lake, Rosseau.

St. PETERS, N. S., Aug. 3.—Kenneth McKay, age 21, of Grand River, was drowned at Black Point yesterday. He was with his father and two others were hauling a mooring line over the stern of the boat when the craft overturned, and young McKay in attempting to swim to another boat sank. The others were rescued.

THE SILVER QUESTION.

Agitates the Denizens of the Orient as Well as the Western Barbarians.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 3.—The steamer Tio Panier, arrived last evening from the Orient. The Hong Kong papers are filled with long editorials and local articles on the depreciation of silver which has brought all business to a standstill. Much excitement was caused by a cable message saying that Mexico was to suspend silver coinage. In this event China would establish a national coinage, as she has a mint at Canton fully equipped for issuing dollars.

In Japan the result has been equally disastrous. The Government has ordered \$3,500,000 on orders on warships alone. Japan produces about \$2,500,000 of silver yearly, and only about \$50,000 of gold, so that the loss to miners will be large.

When, last week, a Baptist Church at Long Island City offered the use of its house of worship to the priest of a neighboring Roman Catholic Church, which had been destroyed by fire, the Baptist pastor said: "We are here for doing good, and I hope to see the day when all churches will join hands in the common object, the glory of God and the salvation of souls." The Roman Catholic pastor, in accepting the generous proffer, wrote that it "tends to send us a long step forward in the direction of that universal brotherhood for which we are all striving."
