Toronto, Oct. 8—8 p.m.—During today a feeble low area, accompanied by showers, has been approaching Ontario from the southward, and the probability is that it will during Monday night be absorbed by a very important disturbance, which is likely to move across the lake region from the Northwest Territories. The temperature is about the same in all parts of the Dominion. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 50-59; Kamloops, 42-55; Prince Albert, 36-56; Qu'Appelle, 28-55; Winnipeg, 32-53; Port Arthur, 30-50; Parry Sound, 24-50; Toronto, 30-57; Ottawa, 32-50; Montreal, 36-52; Quebec, 30-50; Halifax, 38-56.

Local temperature: The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the observatory on Saturday, Oct. 7, were: Highest, 89°; lowest, 28°; on Sunday, Oct. 8, highest 64°, lowest 38°. Today sun rises 6:24, sets 5:46; moon rises 11:32 p.m., sets 8:38 a.m.
