THE ROAD TO KIMBERLEY. Lord Methuen continues his progress toward Kimberley. The stages of his advance up to Tuesday were Gras Pan (or Enslin) to Honeynest Kloof, which he occupied on Monday, nine miles. This is the place where the abovenamed engagment occurred. In all probability his onward march to relieve Kimberley will be from Modder River to Spytfontein, fourteen miles, and Spytfontein to Kimberley, eleven miles. The British advance necessarily proceed along the railway line, which runs almost straight between Honeynest Kloof and Modder The river will be no obstacle, River. as it is small and easily fordable. At Spytfontein there are a few scattered hills, and this is the only point where

the Boers will be able to avail themselves of cover. THE BOER COMMANDER.

Col. Albrecht, who is directing the work of the Boers in opposing Lord Methuen, was originally an officer in the Austrian army. He entered the Free State army and soon brought its artillery to a high state of efficiency. He is known as an able artillerist and strategist.

Lord Methuen's 'troops had to fight without food or water. It seems, how-ever, that he is not using tinned rations. He seizes and pays for fresh food. Usually he begins a march about 3 in the morning, after a breakfast of cocoa. Then he does his fighting or marching, and afterwards pitches his camp near the best water, dining when his transport arrives. The afternoons are given over to resting. Only bare

necessities are allowed. MAGNIFICENT WORK. As one correspondent describes it, the

British are fighting "an omnipresent but almost invisible foe." Unstinted admiration is everywhere expressed of the splendid work of Lord Methuen's column. With a force really inadequate he has marched 53 miles and fought Micmac.... three battles within seven days.

BOER RECRUITING IN THE UNIT-

ED STATES. New York, Nov. 30 .- A special to the Journal from Washington, says: Great Britain has protested vigorously to the government against the organization of expeditions in this country, intended, presumably for the assistance of the Boers. Lord Pauncefote made the protest at the state department. Secretary Hays referred Lord Pauncefote

to the secretary of war. It is no longer a secret that expeditions of importance are being organized. The most notable of these has its headquarters in the suburbs of Washington, and another will be equipped with funds today in New York. Both, it is said, are under the secret auspices of an agent of the Transvaal now in New York. It is understood that there are millions of Dutch and French money behind these filibustering expeditions.

have informed the British ambassador

that every precaution will be taken to prevent the sailing of armed expedi-
