Splendid Standing of the City Line When Independent

Ex-Mayor Anderson on Its Earnings and Advantages.

The Last Annual Balance Sheet Before a Lease to the Great Western.

To the Editor of the Adventiser:

I herewith inclose you a copy of the report for the year 1871 of the directors of the London and Port Stanley Railway, showing the earnings and expenditures of the road for that year.

The information it contains will, I presume, be interesting to the citizens of London at the present time. Having been connected with the road from its inception, and this report being my last, I want to say that at that time the road vas in every respect in first-class condition, as shown by the report, all the outside debts of the company having been paid except the \$32,000 bond held by the city of St. Thomas. I then considered that the value of the road was such that it made a good asset for the \$600,000 worth of bonds held by the city at that time. The receipts of the road during my connection with it increased from \$25,000 per year to \$60,000, and the road had rolling stock, paid for, worth \$60,000, also a half interest in three propellers worth \$40,000. These boats ran to Montreal, and, connecting with the Allan steamships, formed a freight line to Liverpool. Over this line London obtained cheaper freight to and from Liverpool than either Toronto or Hamilton. All the wheat from this part of the country was shipped over this line, and taken at a rate that enabled our buyers to pay 10 cents per bushel more than was paid in either Hamilton or Toronto. If the road had been run on this line to the present time the receipts would lave no doubt increased to \$150,000 per year. Yours truly, M. Anderson.

SCENES IN PARLIAMENT.

An All-Night Session Over the Estimates.

London, March 25 .- The House of Com mons was in session until 5 o'clock this morning considering the army estimates. This ohallenge was received with tremendous shouts by the Liberals. Exciting scenes accompanied the applying of closure. The debate was one of the stormiest of the session.

Disaster in a Pennsylvania Coal Mine-Several Men Mangled.
