> In Hamilton and Torento just now the action of the Buffalo Jockey Club in fixing its dates to clash with the Canadian clubs is creating much discussion, and the organization across the line is being patted on the back by the American papers for scorning the other clubs. A Toronto horseman, who was in the city the other day, and who takes a prominent part in the running of the Woodbine Club, was among those indignant at the stand taken by the Buffalo club.

There is honor even among horsemen," he said to The Advertiser, "and the people across the border are not raising themselves much in the estimation of any of the good turf organizations. By deliberately conflicting with our dates, when it was unnecessary and derogatory to their own interests, they have put themselves in an unenvi-able position. The Canadian clubs are strong enough to stand the strain. however, and there are many American horsemen who would rather come to the Woodbine than go to Buffalo, where last year they failed to put up the quality of races, in spite of the best fact that they had good horses. As to the question of attendance, I think that the Woodbine's following will be loyal to it, and that not a great number Canadians will be attracted to Buffalo." "The suggestion has been made that

a jockey club circuit comprising the cities of Toronto, Hamilton, London, and Windsor be formed, and I can see no objection to it. There would be considerable difficulty, of course, in getting enough people interested in the pro-ject, and it would need to be co-operative and necessarily well financed. AN AUTOMOBILE BOAT

Makes a Record of Twenty-Six Miles an Hour. .

New York, Nov. 7. - A mile in an automobile boat in 2 minutes and 26 seconds, or at the rate of 26 miles an hour, this was the startling performance made today by a new automobile boat. It was done on the Hudson River over the measured course of the Palisade Boat Club, between Ellenwood and Yonkers. The record was made on choppy water, going with the wind. On a second trial over the same course, going against the wind, the mile was covered in just 3 minutes.

The boat is a production of a New York concern, and is a tiny affair as ed with the automobile which in France recently scored 19 and 20 miles an hour in the nautical races there. The craft is only 30 feet water line and 35 feet over all, and weighs only 1,000 pounds all told. The engine weighs 410 pounds and develops 21 horse power. The boat is named Vingt
