Cour Thousand Dollars Spent photos of all the men who have been Since 1st of January—City Hall Gossip.

The extremely cold weather of this winter, and the great amount of snow which fell, has been the cause of a vastly increased expenditure on the part of the board of works this year. Since Jan. 1 it is estimated that the board has spent about \$4,000 on snowcleaning, opening up gutters, gulley-holes and the like.
