The customary examination of the heart and other organs was made, and no contra-indication to the employment of chloroform was found. The anesthetic was administered by one of the house staff in the anaesthetizing room, the patient not having been taken to the operating room at all. His brother, Dr. Wardell, was present at the time, watching his pulse. Before 30 drops of the anaesthetic had been administered the heart's action suddenly ceased, and simultaneously respiration stopped.
