LONDONER HONORED**IN NEW ORLEANS**

Presentation to Mr. Chris. J. Fitzgerald, the Well-Known Starter—A Tribute.

The New Orleans Times-Democrat has the following article regarding a presentation made to Mr. C. J. Fitzgerald the other evening:

"A very pretty incident took place at the Fair Grounds yesterday, just after the running of the Crescent City Derby. It was the presentation of a beautiful and massive silver loving cup, appropriately inscribed, to Starter Fitzgerald on the occasion of his final severance of his professional connection with the Crescent City Jockey Club, which he has served with competence, ability, integrity and loyalty for ten years. No one intimate with local racing during the past ten years will say that this handsome acknowledgment on the part of the Crescent City Jockey Club was not richly merited. During his long term of service in the trying and nerve-racking capacity of starter, Mr. Fitzgerald's conduct has been above reproach. The most capricious of critics have praised his rare ability as a starter, and his absolute honesty of purpose never has been questioned, even in the whispers of the most confirmed and disgruntled of scandal mongers. He has invariably been industrious, conscientious, patient, painstaking and eminently efficient. During his ten winters in New Orleans he has made hosts of valued friends, not alone among the horsemen, but in business and social circles, and the

assembly which gathered to witness the paying of this well-deserved tribute to his ability and character was a distinctly representative one."

Hon. Bernard McCarthey, who made the presentation, paid Mr. Fitzgerald this very high compliment:

"What judge of the bench, what man in his possession, can attain a higher record than yours. Ten years under this southern sun, trying to do your duty as you saw it and with one judgment in its favor, and you are still here, but of the city of New Orleans, an honest man. When we deal with your life from a moral standpoint, and in view of a moral standpoint, and in view of consideration we know that it will be difficult to replace Fitzgerald. We will watch your future career with great interest, and know that a man possessed of your splendid character is bound to attain the highest honors in any position in life to which you may aspire."

"In token of the affection of the gentlemen with whom you have been associated for these many years, and as an evidence of their friendship and esteem, I take great pleasure in presenting you with this loving cup, which is in behalf of the entire city of New Orleans. I wish to extend to you their best wishes for your future success and prosperity."

JAPANESE**REPULSED**

propositions within a week, and they are received with great skepticism.

An official of the foreign office with whom the correspondent of the Associated Press expressed great interest in whether Japan could offer a basis for negotiations acceptable to Russia. Nevertheless, diplomatic circles believe that the Japanese are not the belligerents will find a way without intermediaries to conclude peace. Until Field Marshal Oyama has been ousted from office, it is believed that the Japanese will not move, as naturally any proposal emanating from either side would be accomplished by an arrangement for an armistice.

London, Wednesday, March 15.—By doing in pressing his pursuit of Russia's defeated and demoralized army to the Pass, Field Marshal Oyama has afforded Gen. Kuroki a considerable force of Japanese nearer the Pass than six or eight miles; but in Russian quarters there is a feeling of apprehension that the Japanese are making a move of which there is no definite information is in progress. From Japanese sources it is reported that many strong parties of Russians, cut off from their commands in the retreat from Mukden, are surrendering upon the appearance of Japanese troops.

Is Oyama Too Slow?

The Pass, March 14.—As after the battle of Liao Yang, the advance of the Japanese army against the position of the Russians at the Pass is slow. The leading columns are eight or ten miles southward, and in touch with the Russian army, but the operations at present are not serious. Field Marshal Oyama shows slight intentions of pressing his advance, but is being urged to attack on the Pass. It is possible, however, that a wide turning movement, of which reports are current, is in progress. Such operations the Japanese have the immense advantage of several bases and lines of supply, to which now is added the Shimanto road, while the Russian army necessarily is dependent upon one base, and therefore may be outanked easily. In the grand army order is being brought out of chaos with remarkable celerity. The plain in front of the Pass, which on March 11 seemed like a nest of ants with the dense and confused mass of transport, artillery and troops, corps, divisions and regiments being scattered and parties intermingled, has been cleared, the regiments reorganized, stragglers sent to their respective commands, and the Russian army, their assigned positions, and today the same soldiers who on March 10 became terror-stricken, surging disorganized mass of gray at a few shots from a little detachment of Japanese, or who even fled in panic, firing in confusion at the mere baseless cry of "Japanese cavalry!" are now gathered, singing about the camp fires, with new courage, ready to oppose with stubborn resistance an attack on the Pass. It is unfair to accuse the entire army of this panic. Gen. Linvitch entered the chaos with his regiments in perfect order, with music playing and the men singing, and scarcely a straggler was lost. The Japanese, on the other hand, were in a state of confusion. Many organizations made equally praiseworthy retreats, and especially the rear guards of all the divisions, who performed their difficult tasks steadily and resolutely. There is much to be said also in excuse for the panic-stricken condition of the Russian troops. They were largely composed of young undisciplined men, and wagon drivers were mingled with the soldiers, who, for fifteen days, were under constant fire, crowded together in a mass, from whence egress was impossible. It is one of the odd facts of warfare that the more effect of the beaten Russian army has been largely restored, while the Japanese, though the victors, are apparently still broken, and have incurred such heavy losses that they are unable to press the advantage. Otherwise it is inexplicable why the Japanese have not followed up their vigorous pursuit with an attack on the Pass when they might have taken the position almost without a struggle. It is now too late for an easy success. The struggle for the possession of Mukden cost both sides close upon 200,000 men. The Russian loss of officers includes a large proportion of the regimental commanders and field officers. All the newspaper correspondents, with the exception of three or four, have left for the north, because there is at present nowhere to live and nothing to do. Chafed by defeat, many of the Russian officers are in a surly mood, and much of the grudgingly-given information is colored with jealousy and the rampant spirit of cabal.

Russians Reach Tie Pass.

Gen. Kuroki's Headquarters in the Field, Monday, March 13, via Fusan, March 14.—The greatest part of the retreating Russians are supposed to have reached Tie Pass. The pursuing Japanese have frequent encounters with the rear guard. Gen. Kuroki must remove his supplies from the Pass if he plans a retirement to Harbin, and they will be necessary to maintain the army during their march. The Russians have no stores between Tie Pass and Harbin. St. Petersburg, March 13.—5 p.m.—According to the information received by the war office, the remnants of Gen. Kuroki's army have made good their retirement, and are in no immediate danger of a new turning movement north of the Pass. The Japanese are reported to be completely exhausted by their long, hard fight, and are compelled to rest, undertake the tasks of burying their dead, and

Elizes Two Generals.
The war office admits, however, that Kuropatkin has not furnished specific information as to the whereabouts of Gen. Kamamura, who has been reported to be northeast of the Pass, or of the Japanese columns reported to be pushing north by forced marches west of the railroad. Kuropatkin has also left the war office in the dark in regard to the number of prisoners captured by the Japanese, having made no detailed report about these particulars. Therefore, the general staff is in no position to contradict the two dispatches detailing the Russian losses. While Kuropatkin has assumed full responsibility for accepting a battle at Mukden, he has complained to the Emperor that his plans miscarried largely through the failure of two generals, whose names cannot be learned to execute his orders. He also throws blame on some of the troops, which failed to respond properly at the critical moment.**Queries Answered.**

Southern California Under Five Inches of Rainfall.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 14.—The violent storm that swept Southern California since last Sunday morning from San Diego to the Tehachapi Mountains, interrupting all communications by wire, with Northern California, demoralizing railroad traffic, and flooding the entire country with from three to five inches of rain, shows signs of breaking. The casualties and damage in the vicinity of Los Angeles are briefly summed up as follows: Two men reported drowned and five injured by the washing away of the Seventh street bridge; several other bridges reported to be in weak condition. The damage along the Santa Monica beach is estimated at \$200,000. The auditorium at Ocean Park was wrecked away. Two hundred feet of the Sando breakwater has been washed away. Trains on the Santa Fe and Southern Pacific are stalled by washouts.
