# TRACK ELEVATION NEGOTIATIONS REOPENED GRAND TRUNK ARE NOW READY TO GO AHEAD Both Bodies Found Between Woodstock and Brantford-One Was

Mayor and Officials Had a Very Important Conference in Regard to the Matter Yesterday, When Everything Went Along Smoothly.

## DO IT NOW OR WAIT TWENTY YEARS

Said Vice-President Fitzhugh to the Mayor -- Overhead Bridge at Egerton Street Is Included in What the Company Are Willing to Do for London-Question of

Compensation to Come Up,

Track elevation is not so remote as was thought some time ago, and as a result of a conference between Mayor Stevely, Mr. Fitzhugh, fourth vicepresident of the Grand Trunk, Mr. U. E. Gillen, superintendent, Chief Engineer Kelly of the Grand Trunk system, City Engineer Graydon and other officials, the matter will be taken up very soon, and it is quite probable that an agreement will be reached.

If satisfactory terms can be agreed upon, the work will be commenced this spring. If the matter is delayed any length of time until the company takes up its problems in Toronto and Montreal, it will be fifteen or twenty years before the question will again be opened.

His worship was highly pleased with the conference, and is hopeful that this vexed matter will be solved satisfactorily shortly.

#### THE MAYOR SPEAKS.

"We had a very interesting interview with Mr. Fitzhugh and Mr. Kelly, the chief engineer," said Mayor Stevely. "All seemed very anxious to settle the matter once and for all. Mr. Kelly is the successor to Mr. Hobson, who retired some time ago. He is not yet acquainted with local conditions, but will visit the city very shortly to inquire into the whole matter. His investigation will be thorough, and he will obtain all the information possible on the question. When that is done, the company and the city will get together. Mr. Kelly, in addition to doing Mr. Hobson's work, is also doing some of Mr. McGuigan's, and is at the present time going over the plans made by Mr. Mc-Guigan for the work.

"Mr. Fitzhugh informed us that if there was a delay in the negotiations, so that the company had to take up work in Toronto and Montreal, it would be fifteen or twenty years before London would be reached. As a result he is anxious to get this work completed at once, and then go to the work in Toronto and Montreal.

### EGERTON STREET OVERHEAD BRIDGE.

"The officials agreed to erect an overhead bridge at Egerton street as soon as satisfactory terms are reached. That is something they would not agree to at the last conference. They then wanted five years in which to build that bridge.

"They will agree to remove the street railway tracks from Rectory to Egerton streets. They do not want the street railway tracks on Rectory, as with them it would be impossible to either bridge the street or build a subway under it. With the street railway tracks on Egerton street, Rectory street would not be dangerous, the risks being minimized. On Egerton street would be little or no danger.

## CARRY OUT ORIGINAL PLANS.

"So far as I could learn, the original plans would be carried out. That would mean subways on all the streets downtown until William street was reached, where only a footpath subway would be built.

"Adelaide street would be level, although the tracks would be raised three

"Rectory street would not be very dangerous, with no street car tracks, while Egerton would be properly protected.

"Mr. Fitzhugh asked us what the city's attitude would be regarding the cost, and I told him that the city would expect at least as good terms as two years ago. Of course, the company can put the matter in the hands of the Dominion railway commission, and the city would have to submit to the terms set out by that board. I think, however, that we can agree, as the citizens generally are anxious to have this thing settled.

"They told me that if an agreement were reached, work would be commenced next spring, and would be rushed to completion as rapidly as possi-

"At all events," said the mayor, "Mr. Kelly, the engineer, will make a thorough investigation into the conditions prevailing here right away, and then we can get together. I think the interview was most satisfactory."

The discussion was the result of many weeks' correspondence between Mayor Stevely and Mr. Fitzhugh. The latter wired his worship to meet him yesterday and take the question up, as a result of this correspondence.

#### HISTORY OF THE NEGOTIATIONS. Negotiations for the elevation first commenced in 1904, when Hon. Adam Beck was mayor. Nothing was done in that year, but in the next the ques-

tion was discussed in earnest. Propositions were submitted without number, but they were all turned down by the city. In ex-Mayor Judd's first year, Mr. F. H. McGuigan, who was then in

charge of the work, made a proposition for the company, but after a stubborn fight in the council it was turned down.

Since that time, many efforts have been made by the council to have the matter reopened, but until the present time nothing has resulted. If satisfactory terms can be agreed upon, this vexed question will be

#### forever removed from the sphere of municipal politics. NEW DEPOT NEEDED.

The question of a new depot for London was also referred to during the discussion. Mr. Fitzhugh admitted that a new station was badly needed, and was as desirable for the company as well as for the city. He wanted the whole matter disposed of at once, track elevation and all. He thought that a new station was needed in Toronto, but it was needed infinitely worse here.

NO SPECIAL MEETING. It is not thought probable that a special meeting of the council will be called at present to consider the matter.

"There will be nothing before the council until the Grand Trunk engineer makes his report," said Mayor Stevely. "When he does so there will probably be some correspondence between us and the company, and then we will call a meeting of the council to take the question up, but not until then. In all probability a special committee will be named if the negotiations progress that far. I expect they will, of course, and if nothing intervenes we should receive a favorable proposition from the company."
