#### BACK TO RUSSIA

Murderer's Plea That He Is a Political Refugee Proves Futile.

Chicago, Dec. 5.—Christian Rudowitz, a Russian refugee, must go back to Russia, to stand trial on a charge of murdering three people, unless he is saved by the intervention of the department of state or of the President.
